

Resolving What's Left

The Security Council committee started picking up right where they left off the previous day, and started to discuss the second topic, dealing with international drug trafficking. Resolution 2-6, written by the delegate of Chad, has been chosen and debate began on the resolution. A total of 4 amendments have been made; however, only 3 of these amendments had passed on this resolution. These passing amendments were written by the delegates of France and the United States.

The first amendment that was made had ultimately failed in the end. However, the following three amendments made had successfully been amended to resolution 2-6. Amendments 2-6-B and 2-6-C were both written by the delegate of the United States. Amendment 2-6-B states, "Brings in operative clause 2 from resolution 2-2 and adds the operative at the end of the resolution as operative clause 5 of resolution 2-6." Amendment 2-6-C, which amended operative 2 and strikes operative 3, stated, "Recommends that nations..... and find alternative methods of fighting trafficking, including, but not limited to, the trading of the financial trail of organized crime organizations as one such method."

The third and final passing amendment, amendment 2-6-D, was added as operative clause 6, and was written by the delegate of France, and states, "Stresses the importance of member nations ratifying the United Nations Convention Against Illicit Traffic in Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances."

Shortly after the third passing amendment, debate began on passing resolution 2-6 as it was, and it was passed, finishing the second and last issue of the Security Council's agenda of issues.
