DEEPLY DISTURBED by the the fact that terrorist groups, mainly the Islamic State and The Shield of Libya are controlling large territories in Libya, including Libya's capital Tripoli and,

NOTING WITH THE REGRET that the unstable situation in Libya is affecting the democratic transition in Tunisia and Egypt, and is hindering the political progression they are aiming after the revolutions of 2011 and,

FULLY ALARMED that the situation in Libya did facilitate illegal weapons market which did affect the security of the Middle East and North Africa as these weapons are being used by terrorist groups and radical organization and,

EXPRESSING APPRECIATION of the international community's effort to limit the overall damage caused by the civil war and the United Nations consistency to bring peace and stability to North Africa and,

HAVING STUDIED the geopolitical nature of the area, the alarming situation in Libya and the possible increase of terrorist threats in North Africa may lead to an unrest in Southern Europe and increase the efficiency of the terrorist groups fighting in Sub-Saharan countries and in the Middle East;

2 support, is significantly dominant in the continent of Africa, and
3

4 RECOGNIZING that the causes of poverty are harmful economic systems, conflicts,
5 environmental factors, and population growth, and
6

7 EXPRESSING DEEP CONCERN that Sub-Saharan Africa is responsible for more than one-
8 third of the world's extreme poor and that 27 of those Sub-Saharan African countries have fifty-
9 four percent of residents living in extreme poverty which is the highest proportion among global
10 regions worldwide, and
11

12 HAVING CONSIDERED that seventy-five percent of the world's poorest countries are located
13 in Africa such as Zimbabwe, Liberia, and Ethiopia, also Africa's second largest country,
14 Democratic Republic of Congo, has been ranked the poorest in the world with a Gross Domestic
15 Product of three hundred ninety-four dollars and twenty-five cents, and
16

17 AWARE that the ten countries with the highest proportion of people living in extreme poverty,
18 living on one dollar and twenty-five cents or less per day, were all in Africa, and
19

20 BEARING IN MIND that poverty is the result of human actions, causing difficulty when trying
21 to improve or help the poor;
22

- 23 1) CONSIDERS that the first step to overcoming poverty is to rebuild a reliable
24 government system that will address primary issues within countries of Africa
25 seeking guidance and advice from neighboring countries outside of Africa;
26
- 27 2) NOTES WITH INTEREST that African nations rejuvenate their universities to help
28 education growth that will spark creativity and productivity, this will stop African
29 citizens from moving to other continents;
30
- 31 3) INVITES leadership to promote agriculture within all countries of Africa which will
32 in turn increase job growth and employment for citizens sending their incomes to
33 higher levels;
34
- 35 4) REQUESTS other countries support African nations in their quest to providing
36 economic freedom to the citizens and ending poverty on the continent.

7 Stressing that the use for these child soldiers has consisted of them being fighters, suicide
8 bombers, human shields, spies, messengers, and for sexual purposes, and
9

10 Realizing that the use of child soldiers has spread to every region in the world that is involved
11 with armed conflict in the past years, and
12

13 Grieved that the most likely children to be forcibly recruited to be a soldier are children who
14 have little access to education, displaced from their families, live in a combat zone, or are living
15 in poverty, and
16

17 Inspired by organizations such as Child Soldiers International whose efforts are to end
18 recruitment of soldiers who are under the age of 18 and to prevent their many uses in conflict;
19

- 20 1.) Invites nations to join Child Soldiers International and other organizations in on their
21 work and effort towards putting an end to recruitment of child soldiers in many
22 countries;
23
- 24 2.) Requests nations who are in armed conflict to stop recruiting soldiers under the age
25 of 18 by abduction and force;
26
- 27 3.) Urges developed countries to help raise awareness and funds for child soldiers by
28 spreading knowledge, creating charities, and holding fundraisers for the cause;
29
- 30 4.) Considers that the United Nations help develop a financial and action taking plan
31 towards accomplishing the goal of ending child soldiers;
32
- 33 5.) Calls upon forces to go into countries with child soldiers to help gain control of the
34 problem.

22 strongholds;

2 the countries susceptibility to ecological catastrophes, and

4 EMPHASIZING while making efforts to overcome decades of underdevelopment, financial
5 necessities are required for the economy to thrive, therefore aspiration for the resources of Lake
6 Nyasa is somewhat comprehensible, and
7

8 AFFIRMING the hostility amidst the neighboring countries of Malawi as well as Tanzania,
9 while perceived as sensible is indeed not, and
10

11 ENDORISING that the financial insatiability plaguing both nations is causing senseless violence,
12 and
13

14 COGNIZANT the energy being used to hash out the dispute over the Lake Nyasa territory ought
15 to be being utilized to distinguish weaknesses in the underlying economic, demographic, political
16 and environmental factors of the county and restoring them;
17

18 Adopts that a great deal of the political controversy could be used to establish the Lake of
19 Nyasa as an undeterred geographical border that resides partially in each nation: Malawi,
20 Tanzania, and Mozambique;
21

22 Acknowledging the body of water isn't entirely defined geographically in either region,
23 therefore the borders could be establish upon the lake but the borders don't have to be
24 clearly defined so the lake in its entirety can be regarded as an neutral space and equated
25 as such;
26

27 Declares the lake's territory can't be enacted upon due to it's in availability as a define
28 space, it is fragmented unevenly between the surrounding countries;
29

30 Demands that the existing resources in Lake Nyasa be garnered appropriately by a sort of
31 joint establishment and uniformly distributed between each country;
32

33 Advocates both countries will profoundly benefit from the collaboration in the
34 continuation financial advancement, the necessity for an established border will have no
35 significance.

33 change, that military actions will be the only way to stop these oppressive regimes from
34 happening.

TAKING INTO CONSIDERATION the benefits of having prostitution legalized in other countries such as; another business to tax, more foreign income, and other profitable benefits;

1.) CALLS UPON all countries to follow Singapore's Human Trafficking laws;

2.) EMPHASIZES the benefits and drawbacks from having prostitution legalized in their countries and if they really need it legalized;

2 anyone, let alone children who work for unjust pay, and

4 Noting that children in Asia are forced or taken from their families so that they can work in
5 sweat shops as young as the age of 5, and
6

7 Emphasizing that there are 215 million children start this labor between the ages of 5 and 17, and
8

9 Expressing deep concern the types of labor that these children are performing, which includes;
10 sex trafficking, domestic labor, seafood processing, factories, mining, scavenging, sugar-cane
11 plantations, and various other services, and
12

13 Alarmed that some of these children work up to 18 hours in a single day, earning on average 30
14 cents an hour, and
15

16 Stressing that the children working in all of these various fields are creating a revenue of
17 approximately 30 billion dollars;
18

19 1) Declares that there is a serious need to end child labor which affects 9.3% of the
20 population of children in Asia;
21

13 their hostile nature, and

14
15 **Emphasizing** further that nothing but benefits would come from the cartel becoming severed
16 from the government such as more emphasis on fixing poverty, repairing cities, or helping those
17 who have abused drugs;

- 18
19 1) **Calls upon** nations with a solid government that is clear of corruption to help assist those
20 that don't to understand that they are only hurting themselves by doing this by drawing
21 upon their own lessons, providing counseling, or perhaps military assistance to start the
22 initial extermination of the corruption;
23
24 2) **Invites** all nations that are known to have a lot of corruption to admit it so that aid can be
25 given to them with no fear that violence will reach them for coming forward;
26
27 3) **Expresses with hope** that the United Nations will help to the best of their abilities to
28 make these countries whole again with the citizens no longer living in fear.
