HAVING REGARDED that drug trafficking and organized crime has been a major issue for the 1 United Nations since as early as 1961, and 2 3 4 **REALIZING** that many areas where drug trafficking and organized crime are an issue that there 5 is a high number of civilian deaths, and 6 7 WISHING that these problems would be able to be controlled in countries such as Mexico itself 8 where drug cartels have more power than the actual president, and 9 **BEARING IN MIND** that the United Nations has already made a task force to help nations who 10 11 have an overwhelming amount of problems with drug trafficking and organized crime, and 12 13 **DETERMINDED** to create a world in which problems such as this may be handled once and for 14 all: 15 16 STRESSES that the United Nations must create task forces for the top five nations who 17 involve themselves with transnational drug trafficking and organized the most with these 18 problems; 19 20 URGES nations to create a stronger hold on their export and import system in order to stop drugs that are being transnational sent and received in the first place; 21 22 23 **RECOMMENDS** that civilian families that have live in areas of high concentrations of 24 drug trafficking and organized crime to notify the authorities in their neighborhood of 25 these illicit behaviors so that the authorities may try to stop the problems; 26 27 **EXPRESSES ITS SYMPATHY** to nations where these problems have the most effect 28 to the point that their own economy is hurt due to these actions; 29 30 **REQUESTS** that the areas where the drug trafficking and organized crime are at their 31 highest to be fully searched and have any drugs taken away and any members involved in

organized crime to be taken in and either imprisoned or questioned by the authorities of

the nation in which these actions occur.

1 COGNIZANT of the United Nations continued war on illicit drug trafficking, and 2 3 AFFIRMING an alliance with the United Nations Security Council and Europol against 4 illicit drugs, and 5 EMPHASIZING that more than half of organized crime groups are involved in some 6 7 form of drug trafficking, making drug trafficking intertwined in organized crime, and 8 9 DEPLORING the use of immigration to traffic drugs, and 10 11 DISGUSTED by organized crime bosses who lure unsuspecting female immigrants into a life of prostitution and strife, and 12 13 14 CONSCIOUS of the sensitive nature of transnational organized crime and its unfortunate ties to several third world countries' economies; 15 16 17 1) ASKS for all member nations to agree to a comprehensive plan for handling drug trafficking internationally including: 18 19 a. Reducing supply through prosecution of crime bosses and through 20 extermination of production facilities; 21 b. Reducing demand through education and rehabilitation of those 22 suffering with addiction; c. Increasing international cooperation and communication through 23 24 summits and through a treaty pledging to close boarders to drug 25 traffickers: d. Forbid illicit drugs from the source and stopping their entry into 26 27 member state countries; 28 e. Controlling precursor chemicals used in the manufacturing of illicit 29 substances; 30 2) INVITES all nations to sign such an important pledge; 31 32 33 3) IMPLORES member nations to handle organized crime at home and abroad 34 by: 35 a. Disrupting trafficking organizations: 36 b. Reducing profitability of supply by taking action towards increasing 37 the difficulty of laundering money; 38

39 40 4) <u>HOPES</u> that such severe measures will reduce organized crime and drug trafficking on an international level.

1 GREIVED to know that in the past year there have been over 97,500 people killed around the 2 world due to drug trafficking, and 3 4 BEARING IN MIND that the UN determined from a study done in 2010 on crime rates around 5 the world, that four of the five most violent countries are Latin America due to the continuous 6 drug trade in that area, and 7 8 ALARMED by the fact that Honduras has the world's highest murder rate at twenty homicides a 9 day certainly because of the illicit drug trafficking, and 10 11 COGNIZANT of the fact the majority of drug cultivation occurs in the Americas, particularly the 12 cultivation of cocaine from the Andes Mountains, and is then trafficked and consumed in other continents such as Europe, Asia, and Africa, and 13 14 15 AFFIRMING that eradication efforts in the Andes Mountains have been rather successful in the 16 slow removal of fields causing farmers to lose a large amount of profit, and 17 18 EXPRESSING DEEP CONCERN that the use of illegal drugs have increased nearly 37% around 19 the world since 2010, and 20 DEPLORING the fact the some countries protect and even in some cases endorse the production 21 22 of illegal drugs, and 23 24 1) Supports the continuation of the eradication efforts being made in South America 25 as it will bring a decline in violence and other illegal trades; 26 27 2) Suggests the introduction of UN peacekeeping troops in the areas of the world that is having the greatest trafficking and drug related violence such as Latin America; 28 29 30 3) Emphasizes the importance of starting eradication efforts in parts of Europe and the 31 Middle East; 32 4) Encourages stronger sanctions be made against drug trafficking especially along 33 34 borders by means of air, land, and sea; 35 5) Recommends sanctions be put against countries whose governments condone the 36 illegal manufacturing and trafficking of drugs. 37

Recognizing that 45 NATO troops in Afghanistan have been killed this year by Afghani soldiers 2 supposedly fighting alongside them, the most recent killing 3 Australian troops at their base 3 while they were lounging, while 4 5 Remembering that the current mission of NATO troops in Afghanistan is to train and equip 6 Afghani soldiers to be able to protect their own nation and handle their own security, and 7 8 Pointing out the fact that the President of Afghanistan, Hamid Karzai, has stated he wants NATO 9 forces out by 2014, and that the U.S. successfully negotiated an agreement between NATO members to commit to the target of withdrawing from Afghanistan by 2014, and 10 11 12 Stressing that trust between the NATO troops and Afghani forces must be established and 13 developed for a successful mission in Afghanistan, and 14 Noting with deep concern that Civilian casualties are the main cause of a worsening relationship 15 16 between Afghanistan and the U.S, including a March 11th attack on three Afghani families by a 17 U.S. Army Staff Sergeant killing 16, and 18 19 Acknowledging that NATO forces are in the process of vetting 8,000 Afghani commandos and 20 3,000 Afghani Army Special Forces soldiers who are fighting alongside NATO Special 21 Operations troops throughout the country, and 22 23 1) Implores that NATO Officials hire more individuals capable of performing the 24 correct vetting processes and procedures, as well as supplying those

Alarmed at the growing threats of genocide, war crimes, crimes against humanity, and other acts 1 2 of ethnic cleansing, and 3 4 Noting with grave concern the views of the responsibility to protect, announced seven years ago 5 during the World Summit meeting of 2005, and 6 7 Recognizing its goal to provide a legal and moral basis for assisting civilians in the event of a 8 state's failure to do so in the specific context of these four crimes listed, and 9 10 Noting with regret that views on this concept from thoughts of skepticism to full support, and 11 12 1) Recommends that we look upon this in a favorable light, not an unfavorable one, and; 13 14 2) Requests that we make it our main concern to protect the civilians of States who are 15 unable to do so themselves to the fullest extent of our power, and; 16 17 3) Urges not only the Security Council, but every member of the United Nations to 18 assess this matter for the safety of civilians and states unable to prevent any number 19 of dangerous, large, or numerous crimes against humanity, and; 20 21 4) Welcomes any act from any country that can continue to protect civilians of every 22 State and keep the peace, as is the reason of both the General Assembly and the United Nations as a whole body. 23
