<u>STRESSING</u> the importance that responsible action be taken by nation-states in response to such civil unrest as demonstrations, protests, and riots, and

<u>APRECIATING</u> those nation-states throughout the international community which, through their positive efforts, have continued to responded responsibly to civil unrest within their borders, and

<u>Drawing attention</u> to the mass political protest and riots in Kiev, the capital city of Ukraine, in response to Ukrainian president Viktor Yanukovych's unexpected refusal to sign an EU economic agreement and the ensuing bargain struck with Russia over Ukrainian debt and natural gas prices, and

Alarmed by the number of casualties as a result of these protests which stood at more than 1,000 injured and 25 dead as of February 19th, 2014, and

<u>Point out</u> that in late January 2014, the rebels rejected a proposal from President Yanukovych under which opposition leader Arseniy Yatsenyuk would have become the prime minister and been able to dismiss the government as well as other things, and

Acknowledging the amnesty agreement struck between the Ukrainian government and the rebels on February 16th, 2014 which cleared protesters from two major city areas and freed 243 prisoners of the protests as well as UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon's statement urging both the protesters and the government to "redouble their efforts in building upon the agreement", and

<u>Having examined</u> the current state of affairs in Libya, two years after the overthrow of government by the people with the assistance of the UN, where rival militias have gradually turned the country into fiefdoms independent from government authority, only leading to more bloodshed, and

Recalling the UN Charter which states "Nothing contained in the present Charter shall authorize the United Nations to intervene in matters which are essentially within the domestic jurisdiction of any state" and prohibits the Security Council from taking enforcement action except in response to threats to international peace and security, and

Observing that the violence and conflict within Ukraine has not spread across its borders into other nations,

1) <u>Strongly discourages any intervention by member nations or the United Nations as a whole, as any intervention would be acting perpendicularly to the principles in the UN Charter;</u>

2) <u>Calls upon</u> both the protesting faction and the standing government to reach an internal solution through discussion and focused planning built upon the agreements already in place;
