1 CONCERNED that the number of people slaughtered by terrorism has risen 80% from 2014 to
2 2015, and
3

4 NOTING that a great majority of that threat occurs in the surrounding states of Iraq, Afghanistan,
5 Pakistan, Nigeria, and Syria, and
6

7 NOTING WITH DEEP CONCERN the effects that terrorism had on the world, with 11,774
8 attacks worldwide occurred in 2015 resulting in the deaths of 28,328 people, and
9

10 STRESSING that although The Republic of Sudan is still considered to be on the United States
11 Terrorism Watch List, The Republic of Sudan has cooperated in countering ISIL and other
13 terrorist groups for the past six months and has released many public statements regarding the
14 issue, and
15

16 NOTING that the United States has openly welcomed The Republic of Sudan's efforts in
17 cooperating with counterterrorism efforts by preventing ISIL movement through the state and
18 providing intelligence to the United States;
19

20 1) SUGGESTS that the United States fund The Republic of Sudan in their efforts to
21 protect their borders from terrorist threats so that they can effectively counter terrorism in
22 the Middle East and have the ability to provide intelligence to the United States;
23

24 2) ENCOURAGES the United States to remove The Republic of Sudan from the list of
25 terrorism state sponsors due to an increased cooperation and support in the fight against
26 terrorism in the past six months;
27

28 3) SUGGESTS that the remaining states of Syria and Iran, who have been declared by the
29 United States as a state sponsor for terrorism, make greater strides in reducing the
30 presence of terrorism in their states for the well-being of their people and the people of
31 the world that are being affected by terrorism.

Noting that terrorism is defined as the use of violence and intimidation in the pursuit of political aims, and

Aware that the most common forms of terrorism are bombings, kidnapping, armed attacks, assassinations, arson, hijacking and skyjacking, and

Acknowledging that terrorists do not discriminate amongst their victims, therefore it is wrongful state that terrorism is derived from one particular ethnicity of faith, and

Realizing that in 2016 there were 14% less fatalities due to terrorism but in 2015 there was a 14% rise in terrorism, displaying that the UN are beginning to counteract terrorism, and

Noting with Grave Concern that in 2015, almost 12,000 attacks were carried out globally and about 28,330 were killed as a result, and

Recognizing that the top three nations that are faced with terrorism are Iraq, Afghanistan and Pakistan, and

Noting With Regret that 92 countries were victims of terrorism in 2015;

- 1) Acknowledges to the UN and other nations that supply money to Pakistan to cease in doing this because Pakistan is misusing it to support terrorism in Afghanistan;
- 2) Encourages that peaceful tactics be used to fight terrorism, in order to prevent future conflicts such as a promotion of international unity;
- 3) Suggests that the United Nations send peacekeeping forces to Afghanistan to help maintain a strong defense in fighting against Pakistan and other such terrorists;
- 4) Keeps in Mind that mentally ill terrorists could be easily apprehended by adequate mental health care facilities and programs, therefore every UN nation should be required to have a UN approved facility and program that is inspected twice a year, by UN appointed agencies.

18

- 19 1) STRESSES the importance of fighting against groups such as Hamas and Hizbullah, who
20 are fighting Israel on the Homefront, as they must be dealt with by Israel before others,
21 and
22
- 23 2) PROMOTES the unity between all nations plagued by terrorism, as well as those who are
24 not, as teamwork is vital if terrorism wants to be ended in all areas, and
25
- 26 3) IMPLORES the balance of all four pillars against terrorism, as Israel, among others, have
27 always called for the pillars, yet attempts to disrupt it seem to have been recently made,
28 and
29
- 30 4) ENCOURAGES STRONGLY the eradication of certain political, social and religious
31 figures who call for terrorism, as we see them as the root to modern terrorism, and
32
- 33 5) SUGGESTS the United Nation to apply heavy sanctions on Iran, as wherever there seems
34 to be terror, Iran is usually behind it through funding, and because of this, they must be
35 sanctioned.

- 4) ENCOURAGES STRONGLY the balance between our respect for human rights during our counter terrorism procedures and providing the world with security on the issue of terrorism, meaning that they must be complementary, and one cannot be favored over another;

- 1.) **Recommends** nations continue to develop their work for helping citizens and educate them on what is the most responsible and effective ways to deal with tragedies;
- 2.) **Encourages** military leaders to advance resources for counter terrorism attacks so citizens can continue to not live in fear;
- 3.) **Considers** International conventions and protocols against terrorism while implementing efforts to reach comprehensive agreement towards international terrorism;
- 4.) **Recognizes** that all efforts towards combatting and preventing terrorism must remain under the authority of international law.

19 alliances and programs against these attacks and other possible issues associated with terrorism
20 and other extremist problems at home and abroad, and
21

22 1.) Invites other nations to join in strengthening our efforts against terrorism by creating
23 an additional committee in the Plan of Action to Prevent Violent Extremism with
24 funding and military support from all countries involved;
25

26 2.) Asks all nations to consider meeting to speak of strategies against foreign terrorist
27 groups and contribute ideas, funds, troops, support, and help to innocent people
28 affected by terrorist groups, specifically ISIS;
29

30 3.) Suggests creating a committee determined to find a solution to terrorist activities with
31 or without force by joining all members of the United Nations to send joint troops and
32 funds to areas where terrorism is common, where possible threats have been made,
33 and where any recent attacks have been made.

17 this is an excellent organization the United Nations has, but it is not doing all that it
18 could;

- 20 2.) Requests that the United Nations review this Global Counter Terrorism Strategy more
21 than just the usual every two years to keep more up to date on the current terrorism
22 situation throughout the world;
23
- 24 3.) Recommends that the United Nations makes more serious threats towards these
25 terrorism groups and organizations to help aid in stopping the spread of terrorism around
26 the world;
27
- 28 4.) Supports the notion that the United Nations should consider spending troops over to
29 fight these ceaseless groups, and help end this terrorism that is spreading throughout the
30 globe without no end;
31
- 32 5.) Suggests that the United Nations' members work together with their fellow members to
33 work on a solution or generate more ideas on the terrorism occurring and how to counter
34 it before it makes its way all across the world, and not just in the Middle East.

12

14 recent years throughout many UN member countries such as the attack on Istanbul Ataturk
15 Airport in Turkey on July 5, 2016, and

- 16
17 1) **Urges** nations to take action to prevent terrorism in all its forms by joining
18 international conventions and strategies against terrorist organizations;
- 19
20 2) **Invites** nations to use the abilities of the United Nations in areas dealing with
21 conflict prevention as the peaceful resolution of these conflicts would help
22 strengthen the fight against terrorism;
- 23
24 3) **Suggest** the implementation of regular meetings for exchanging information and
25 assistance in reference to the counter-terrorism abilities of a country in order to
26 develop their abilities to fight the spread of terrorist organizations;
- 27
28 4) **Welcomes** member nations to contribute financial aid to countries currently
29 struggling to fight against these organizations or who have dealt with an influx in
30 refugees due to terrorist attacks and fighting in countries like Syria;
- 31
32 5) **Considers** a voluntary system of relief that would help support and address the
33 needs of the victims of terrorism and would contribute in the normalization of
34 their lives after these attacks.

7
8 **Recognizing** the careful thought put into the creation of the Global Counter-Terrorism Strategy
9 and its four pillars dedicated to recognizing conditions that spread terrorism, preventing
10 terrorism, increasing the involvement of the United Nations, and ensuring basic human rights,

12

21 **Reaffirming** that one of the original goals of the United Nations is "to practice tolerance and live
22 together in peace with one another as good neighbors," an idea that is crucial to the method of
23 combatting global terrorism, and

24
25 1.) **Urges** nations to continue to uphold this fight being waged against terrorism and commit
26 to it as a coordinated force;

27
28 2.) **Suggests** that the policy be reviewed more frequently due to the constant increase in the
29 number of terrorist attacks and their fluidly growing forces;

30
31 3.) **Recommends** that any and all changes to the UN Global Counter Terrorism Strategy be
32 done with respect to the UN Charter and any related Security Council resolutions, all the
33 while remaining respectful to all Member States' laws and policies;

34
35 4.) **Commends** nations that have specifically aided this cause and donated their valuable
36 resources in the hopes of ending this terrible spread of terrorism.

5 RECOGNIZING that 11,774 terrorist attacks were orchestrated in 2015 alone from the lack of
6 unity and cooperation in the global theater due to harsh relations between ethnic and national
7 groups, and
8

9 HESITANT to stand by and watch another attack occur such as the ones in France and many
10 Middle Eastern countries without intervention and restoration of order, and
11

12 CITING that lethargy and deep cultural divides prevent any sustained effect in regards to peace
13 in these war-torn areas filled with radicalized terrorism, and
14

15 DOUBTING the effectiveness of the UN's four pillar plan to combat global terrorism because of
16 its non-specific and broad ideas, and
17

18 EMPHASIZING the necessity of a diplomatic, peaceful path to strike down the increasing
19 amounts of terrorist attacks while remaining convicted and steadfast;
20

- 21 1) PROMOTES the utilization of a stronger peacekeeping force in terrorism-riddled
22 areas to prevent insurrection and mass-scaled deaths, and
23
- 24 2) ENCOURAGES all member nations to strengthen bonds with African and Middle
25 Eastern countries to cooperate on anti-terror strategies, and
26
- 27 3) CALLS UPON the victim nations to lead the way towards a more peaceful world
28 through the means of increased technology and military funding to increase
29 surveillance and discourage terrorism, and
30
- 31 4) URGES all member nations to revise the four pillar strategy to encourage a stricter
32 hold on global terrorism that focuses more on elimination of groups rather than
33 suppression, and
34
- 35 5) EXPRESSES the urgent need for funding and military assistance for many countries
36 torn apart by terrorism that no longer possess the necessary tools and skills to
37 establish their own anti-terror systems

1 KEEPING IN MIND that terrorism is the use of violence to frighten and harm people to achieve a
2 political goal and that the UN Global Counter Terrorism Strategy consists of 4 pillars, regarding the
3 conditions conducive to the spread of terrorism, preventing and combating terrorism, building state's
4 capacity and strengthening the role of the United Nations, and ensuring human rights and the rule of law,
5 and,
6

7 DEEPLY DISTURBED by the dramatic and sudden increase in terrorist activity, with 32, 685 deaths due
8 to terrorist attacks in 2014 around the world, this numbered raised by 14,574 (an 80% increase), five
9 Middle Eastern countries which struggle the most with terrorism also showed the largest increase, with
10 11,843 more deaths in 2014, and,
11

12 NOTING WITH DEEP CONCERN the increase of countries which have seen terrorism in their
13 countries, in 2014 the number of countries which suffered over 500 deaths increased by 120%, also, 93
14 countries reported a terrorist attack while 48 of those countries reported an increase in terrorism in 2014,
15 and,
16

17 EMPHASIZING the presence of specific main terrorist groups such as Boko Haram, ISIL (Da'esh), the
18 Taliban, Fulani militants, and al-Shabaab, these five groups caused 74% of terrorist related deaths in
19 2014, Boko Haram caused 6,644 deaths (453 attacks), ISIL caused 6,073 deaths (1,071 attacks), Boko
20 Haram and ISIL were the two leading terrorist groups, and,
21

22 RECOGNIZING the other main terrorist groups which caused destruction, the Taliban caused 3,447
23 deaths (891 attacks), Fulani militants caused 1,229 deaths (154 attacks), and Al-Shabaab caused 1,021
24 deaths (496 attacks) in 2014 alone, these groups are also involved in conflicts and battles outside of
25 terrorist attacks, and,
26

27 TAKING INTO CONSIDERATION that Al-Qaeda is another leading terrorist group who has been very
28 active more so in past years, with more than 4,400 deaths between 1992 and 2008, and that other terrorist
29 groups are associated with Al-Qaeda who are also very active, the Al-Qaida Sanction Committee tries to
30 stop Al-Qaeda and ISIL activity by freezing assets, enforcing travel bans, and arms embargo;
31

- 32 1) APPROVES moderate teaching in schools and the education of terrorist issues and how to
33 rebuild after a crisis happens, along with moderating media to not show a bias towards any
34 groups specifically;
35
- 36 2) RECOMMENDS the suggestion to Security Council to provide United Nations Peace keepers
37 in conflicting nations in order to ensure peace from the United Nations only and no other
38 foreign nations;
39
- 40 3) SUPPORTS the Al-Qaida Sanction Committee, which helps to prevent attacks from Al-
41 Qaeda, ISIL, and other associated terrorist groups by using the aforementioned sanctions.

EXPRESSING DEEP CONCERN over the amount of terrorist acts arising in the recent past, which are increasing in both severity and in occurrence, and

TAKING INTO ACCOUNT that these recent acts have not been properly managed, as multiple countries are still suffering from the effects of terror, in addition to currently facing terror groups, and

MINDFUL of the ongoing situation in the Middle East, pertaining specifically to ISIS and the issues posed by their acts, which has not been effectively handled by the current Counter-terrorism Strategy in place, and

ALARMED at the lack of progress that the current strategy is providing against terrorism since its implementation, along with each of the previous reviews, and

STRESSING the need for a more frequent summit to be held amongst the UN members, as two years leaves too much time between revisions, during which different cases of terrorism could arise and hinder the performance of the strategy;

- 1.) **EMPHASIZES** that more countries need to implement more forms of security, either by their own propositions, or requesting assistance from the UN to provide peacekeepers until the need for them dissipates;
- 2.) **URGES** that the UN hold a summit in the near future, earlier than the original set date, to reach a consensus on how to alleviate these specific issues and their effects;
- 3.) **CALLS UPON** the Counter Terrorism Implementation Task Force to convene and generate plausible ideas to handle the current Middle Eastern situation, both physically, as in the implementation of peacekeepers, and from a distance, such as creating new ways to stop the recruitment and transport of terrorist followers;
- 4.) **DIRECTS** the UN towards the formation of a subcommittee whose main goal is to allocate means of stopping monetary flow towards these terror groups, both in these recent acts, and an amendment to the Counter-Terrorism review strategy pertaining to the stemming of monetary resources in the future;
- 5.) **REQUESTS** that the UN come together at the earliest convenience to discuss the possible adjustment of the summit dates to become annual, as opposed to the schedule already in place.

1 **RECONIZING** that terrorism is a exponentially growing problem that continues to spread
2 rapidly each year and that millions of people have been killed and violently injured annually by
3 activities of terrorism, and

4
5 **TAKING INTO ACCOUNT** there are programs (CTC, UNCCT, NATO, etc.) were formed to
6 attempt at bringing the growing mass issue of terrorism to a halt, but they have sought after these
7 goals but have failed to meet them, and

8
9 **ALARMED** that the number of hostages that are taken by terrorist organizations is growing
10 excessively and the difficulty of rescuing these hostages is becoming more difficult to achieve,
11 and

12

AWARE OF the fact that some nations are able to help themselves and are self-sufficient, 82 countries are considered "Low Income" and "Lower Middle Income" and with 215 World Bank member economies and all other economies with populations of more than 30,000, more than 38% of all economies would potentially be unable to take care of themselves in a crisis;

- 1) **CALLS UPON** nations to increase their activity with the United Nations because for many other nations, the UN may be their only way to even partially recover from a natural disaster, so with the full help of the UN, some nations may come out of a crisis;
- 2) **URGES** all nations to see another need to increase imports, exports, industry, and economy in general because there is no group, even the UN, which will help in a crisis 100% of the time and it is better for nations to be financially able to help themselves in a disaster;
- 3) **SUGGESTS** that the UN still keep a strong help for natural disasters because many countries will need it and cannot make it by themselves, but all nations need to try to become self-sufficient before receiving assistance from any external group that could be helping with something else somewhere else.
