1 **ALARMED BY** the gross violation of human rights and crimes against humanity by Boko
2 Haram, especially the targeting of women and children on a massive scale, and
3

4 **DEEPLY DISTURBED** by the negligence of other nations in allowing this travesty to continue
5 without consequences to the perpetrators and without consideration of the pain and suffering
6 inflicted on countless families, villages, and communities, and
7

8 **CONVINCED** that these kidnappings, rapes, attacks, mutilations and possibly more devastating
9 offenses will continue to run rampant without the intervention and protection by the global
10 community , and
11

12 **KEEPING IN MIND** the potential for Boko Haram's reign of terror to expand and threaten
13 countries outside of Nigeria's borders and the possibility of support, collaboration, and
14 contribution with ISIS;
15

16 1) **CONDEMNS** the actions of Boko Haram that have traumatized, destroyed and
17 created negative lasting effects on many communities throughout Nigeria;
18

19 2) **EXPRESSES ITS APPRECIATION** to the nations who are already active in the
20 fight against Boko Haram, such as France;
21

22 3) **EMPHASIZES** that everyday without action from outside sources results in more
23 deaths, more destruction, and the continuing rapes and abuse of the 200 young
24 schoolgirls taken over a year ago;
25

26 4) **CALLS UPON** all able countries to actively commit troops in the effort to stop the
27 ruthless murders, bombing, destruction of villages, kidnappings, and forced marriages
28 taking place everyday under Boko Haram's control.

1 **NOTING WITH GRAVE CONCERN** the trail of destruction left across northern Nigeria by
2 The extremist Group Boko Haram whose harsh fundamentalist version of Islam rejects Western and
3 secular influences, and

4
5 **NOTING** the group has pledged allegiance to ISIS and at times has controlled territory roughly the size
6 of Belgium, instituting a version of Sharia Law so extreme the likes of it have never been seen in Sub-
7 Saharan Africa, and

8
9 **ANXIOUS** about the recent attacks reaching into not only Nigeria, but into Chad and Cameroon, that
10 were carried out by the groups 7,000 to 10,000 person army, and

11
12 **EMPHASIZING** the current debilitating refugee crisis taking place within the neighboring states of
13 Chad, Cameroon, and Niger who are collectively housing an estimated 90,000 Nigerian refugees due to
14 Boko Haram, and

15
16 **HAVING REVIEWED** the Security Council presidential statement 2012/17 stating, The Security
17 Council has a strong and unequivocal condemnation of terrorism in all its forms and manifestations, and

18
19 **CONFIDENT** that the training, consolidation and redeployment of Nigerian military defense and
20 security forces as well as the forces of Nigeria's surrounding allies is vital to ensure Nigeria and it
21 surrounding counterparts' long term security and stability;

- 22
23 1) **COMMANDS** Boko Haram immediately stop action that is in direct violation of the
24 International Declaration of Human Rights;
25
26 2) **DECLARES**, with insubordination, complete military action against Boko Haram as well as
27 put into place counter terrorist strategies proven to work against such groups in the past such
28 as;
29
30 3) **URGES** countries to continue in their assistance with the coalition involving Nigeria, The
31 Republic of Chad, Cameroon, Niger, and Benin against Boko Haram via economic
32 resources, and or military supplies;
33 a) the creation of a multinational task force with UN authorization to use military force;
34 b) a UN trust fund to provide financial support to the task force;
35 4) **CONFIDENT** that with the cooperation of all member states the downfall of Boko Haram
36 can be achieved in compliance with international law, especially in regards to international
37 human rights, and humanitarian law.

1 **COGNIZANT** that Boko Haram has increased its activity in Borno providence, and confirmed that
2 leader Abubakar Shekau is still alive and bent on spreading his extremist ideology, and
3

4 **AWARE** that the primary source of income for Boko Haram is through crime, which only further
5 destabilizes the regions that they occupy, and
6

7 **RECALLING** past actions such as UNSCR 1267, UNSCR 1904, and UNSCR 2083, which define
8 economic punishments such as the al-Qaida Sanctions Committee for terrorists, terror groups, and any
9 nations that back them, and
10

11 **EXPRESSING DEEP CONCERN** that Boko Haram is a subordinate of Daesh, a wealthy and vast
12 terrorist group with fighter jets, tanks, artillery, and chemical weapons, and
13

14 **GRIEVED** that Boko Haram has seen success recently, with such attacks as a September 2015 bombing
15 in Maidiguri killing between 54 and 85 people, a series of bombings in Abuja in late September and early
16 October 2015 killing more than 18 people, and an assault on Baga in January 2015 that may have killed
17 anywhere from 150 to 2,000 people, and
18

19 **TAKING INTO ACCOUNT** that Boko Haram is an international group, with sects and attacks in
20 Nigeria, Niger, Cameroon, Chad, and Benin, with ties to al-Shabaab, Movement for Oneness and Jihad in
21 West Africa, al-Qaeda in the Maghreb, al-Qaeda, al-Mourabitoun, and Daesh, and
22

23 **EXPRESSING DEEP CONCERN** that the United States, the United Kingdom, and the French Republic
24 have all sent military aid to Nigeria outside of the United Nations, without being accountable for their
25 military donations, and
26

27 **MINDFUL** that Boko Haram's attack methods, targets, and time between attacks are all widely varied,
28 and their sources of income are criminal and untraceable, making the restoration of peace in Nigeria a
29 long and difficult military and political task, and
30

31 **EMPHASIZING** that military aid and intervention be sent transparently through a United Nations
32 peacekeeping operation;
33

34 1) **APPEALS** that the United States, the United Kingdom, and France cease their independent
35 military assistance and operations in Nigeria, and instead work as part of a new United Nations
36 peacekeeping operation;
37

38 2) **SUGGESTS** that this peacekeeping operation be jointly led by Russia, China, and the United
39 States.

AFFIRMING Boko Haram, or more officially Jama'atu Ahlis Sunna Lidda'awati wal-Jihad ("People Committed to the Propagation of the Prophet's Teachings and Jihad"), as a terror group formed in 2002 by Jihadist extremists with the intent of ridding their territories of western influenced education and creating an Islamic State, and

UNDERSTANDING that Boko Haram's refusal to participate in legitimate government, and hatred of secular schooling, is based in radical religious beliefs, and

EMPHASIZING the organization's willingness to use violence, in the form of bombings, abductions, occupation of towns, and assassinations, to further promote their cause, and

RECOGNIZING that these acts of terror are in direct violation of international peace statutes and impede on the human rights of the civilians in the region affected, and

NOTING Boko Haram's close relation, in motive and action, with terror group ISIS (Islamic State in Iraq and Syria), and

STRESSING that northern Nigeria has become a de facto war zone with 4,000 deaths attributed to the group's attacks in 2014, 1,500 civilians killed in the first months of 2015, 2,000 women kidnapped in 2014, and thousands of refugees fleeing the area in search of safety, but

CONFIDENT that with full participation of all United Nations member states that this, and any other, terror threat can and will be eliminated in the pursuit of greater world stability;

- 1.) INVITES international support of an African Union led task force, created with the intent of eradicating Boko Haram through offensive, military action;
- 2.) WELCOMES aid in the form of monetary donations, technological weaponry, and armed forces to:
 - (a.) Provide education to a greater number of civilians to stop the terror organization in its recruitment operations, which rely on participant ignorance;
 - (b.) Stop the flow of funding into the group through stronger border patrol;
 - (c.) Ensure greater civilian protection;
- 3.) URGES all nations to recognize the threat terror organizations hold and how stopping Boko Haram can set a precedent on how these threats will be handled in the future.

1 RECALLING the principles of the Charter of the United Nations, and the responsibility of the Security
2 Council for the maintenance of international peace and security, and

3
4 ALARMED by the widespread human rights violations committed by Boko Haram in various African
5 nations, such as Nigeria, Cameroon, Niger, and Chad, and

6
7 RECALLING the United Nation's designation of Boko Haram as a terrorist organization on May 22,
8 2014 through the addition of the organization to paragraph 1 of Security Council Resolution 2083 on
9 Threats to International Peace and Security Caused By Terrorist Acts, and

10
11 DEPLORING the despicable and indiscriminate crimes of Boko Haram, such as the Baga Massacre, the
12 Chibok Kidnapping, and the July Mosque Massacres, and

13
14 NOTING WITH GRAVE CONCERN the commitment and pledge of allegiance of Abubakar Shekau, the
15 leader of Boko Haram, to the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL) on March 7, 2015, effectively
16 combining the forces of Boko Haram and ISIL, and

17
18 RECOGNIZING the political instability of Nigeria, as well as the inability of the Nigerian military to
19 properly defend against the terrorist group, and

20
21 DETERMINED to restore safety, security, and normalcy to people living in regions affected by the
22 conflict with Boko Haram, and

23
24 REFERRING to the precedents set by prior Security Council resolutions such as S.C. 1244, S.C. 1925,
25 S.C. 1990, and S.C. 1996, where the Security Council authorized peacekeeping operations through its role
26 per the Charter of the United Nations;

- 27
28 1) CONDEMNS Boko Haram, and its affiliated organizations, for their heinous and
29 abhorrent violations of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and various statutes of
30 international legislation;
31
32 2) DEMANDS that Boko Haram and its affiliates cease operations and disband;
33
34 3) AUTHORIZES the deployment of United Nations Peacekeeping forces to maintain a
35 security presence in regions of Nigeria where Boko Haram is active and enforce
36 Operative Clause 2 of this Resolution;
37
38 4) RECOMMENDS the appointment of a special military advisor to act as a liaison between
39 the Security Council, the Secretary-General, and the peacekeeping forces.

1 Appreciating joint actions taken by the Nigerian Air Force and Cameroonian Army in combatting
2 and capturing extremists, especially in the case of liberating the Nigerian trading hub of Banki, where
3 they captured more than 200 Boko Haram militants, and
4

5 Endorsing the summit conducted in August of 2015 by the Economic Community of Central African
6 States (ECCAS) and the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) in order to
7 develop a common strategy to more cooperatively and effectively combat Boko Haram, but
8

9 Alarmed by the fact that Boko Haram controls about 50,000 km² of northeast Nigeria, claiming to
10 have established their own caliphate, in comparison to ISIS's smaller 31,000 km² caliphate, and
11

12 Grieved by the fact that 2.1 million civilians have been displaced due to Boko Haram's insurgency,
13 in addition to more than 17,000 people killed according to Amnesty International, and
14

15 Noting with grave concern the lack of military funding and poor equipment used against Boko
16 Haram, as well as the levels of public distrust in the Nigerian Army, where 45% of Nigerians believe
17 it is corrupt, and
18

19 1) Calls Upon nations affected by Boko Haram to create incentive-based programs for their
20 respective militaries aimed to encourage accountability and transparency;
21

22 2) Suggests that nations create a fund with the purpose of aiding other nations affected by
23 Boko Haram in order to lessen budgetary constraints and contribute to the overall
24 effectiveness of measures taken against the insurgents, as well as to contribute to
25 humanitarian aid;
26

27 a. Recommends that a third-party organization monitors this fund so as to ensure
28 that it is not misused;
29

30 3) Invites nations affected by Boko Haram, as well as all nations willing and able to help, to
31 hold bi-annual summits aimed but not limited to discussing progress and future plans, as well
32 as managing the humanitarian crisis at hand.

1 **Observing** the horrifying attacks that have been carried out by Boko Haram including the recent
2 suicide bombing in Cameroon on October 11, 2015 carried out by two girls age 13 and 17 which
3 killed nine and injured 29 others, another attack was carried out by Boko Haram in Chad only 5
4 days before when suicide bombings killed 36 and injured an excess of 50 others, Boko Haram is
5 uses young teens and women to carry out attacks against civilians in the neighboring countries of
6 Chad and Cameroon, The need for assistance and aid for the people affected by these attacks is
7 as prevalent as ever, and
8

9 **Recognizing** the rampant destruction that Boko Haram has been allowed to commit, actions
10 must be taken to put a stop to this militant group, Boko Haram is using their young kidnapped
11 victims to carry out their dangerous suicide bombings in Nigeria and surrounding countries that
12 are trying to combat the rebel forces, and
13

14 **Understanding** the dire need for aid in Nigeria to help those affected by the Muslim Extremist
15 group Boko Haram, the armed clashes between government forces and rebel groups have caused
16 a huge amount of displacement inside Nigeria's borders of roughly half a million people, other
17 neighboring countries such as Chad and Cameroon have had influxes of Nigerian civilians who
18 are fleeing from Boko Haram;
19

- 20 1.) **Request** other nations to supply aid to countries affected by Boko Haram such as
21 Nigeria, Chad, Cameroon, and other countries that are affected, this includes sending
22 medical aid and assisting in setting up refugee camps to provide a safe place for
23 fleeing Nigerians outside in the neighboring countries borders;
24
- 25 2.) **Calls Upon** nations to provide safe places to protect young teens girls and women to
26 prevent them from being kidnapped, providing a safe place for these women outside
27 of Nigeria and its border countries will provide medical aid and education;
28
- 29 3.) **Insist** on other nations to supply manpower to assist in fighting Boko Haram's
30 already dwindling numbers, offering training to Chadian and Nigerian forces to help
31 combat the rebels who are already on the run, supplying weapons to the government
32 to help combat Boko Haram.

DEPLORING the fact that since its inception in 2009, Boko Haram has killed over 17,000 innocent citizens in northeast Nigeria, and

GRIEVED that Boko Haram kidnapped 276 schoolgirls in the town of Chibok on April 14, 2014 and recently murdered 80 people on horseback in northeast Nigeria, and

ALARMED that Boko Haram's activities have spread from Nigeria to the neighboring countries of Chad, Niger, Cameroon, and Lagos, and

CONCERNED with the fact that Boko Haram, whose first, main objective is to enforce their own extreme version of Sharia law, can now achieve that goal very easily since they formally pledged allegiance to ISIL in March, 2015, and

APPLAUDING the adoption of CTC Resolution 1624 (2005) for its global approach and strategies to combat terrorist groups and organizations;

- 1.) **CALLS UPON** the international community to enact and enforce all counter terrorism strategies listed in CTC Resolution 1624 (2005);
- 2.) **DESIGNATES** a subcommittee be formed and each one be assigned to a country whose citizens are being harassed by Boko Haram to:
 - a.) Provide medical aid and refuge to the civilians within those countries;
 - b.) Organize a force of IGO peacekeepers and send them to those aforementioned countries to combat Boko Haram and reduce the amount of civilian casualties;
 - c.) Donate any and all possible financial aid to affected countries;
 - d.) Provide peacekeeping troops to patrol and secure the borders between Chad, Cameroon, Nigeria, and Lagos;
 - e.) Form an intelligence force completely specialized in getting information about future actions being planned by Boko Haram;
 - f.) Counteract the use of ISIS propaganda primarily through the use of social media sites being used to recruit radicals to Boko Haram's cause;
- 3.) **DEMANDS** that another U.N led organization be specifically devoted to finding and returning the Chibok schoolgirls to their homes;
- 4.) **AUTHORIZES** the use of force against international terrorists and international terrorist groups associated with Boko Haram under Chapter VII of the United Nations Charter;
- 5.) **REQUESTS** that further sanctions be enacted and current sanctions enhanced to deprive Boko Haram financial resources.

1 **AWARE** that the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons Treaty (NPT) requires a review of the
2 operation of the treaty every five years, and

3
4 **ALARMED** that the participants of the 2015 NPT Conference were not able to come to a
5 conclusion for the draft of the Final Document, and

6
7 **CONCERNED** that while the NPT Treaty is known as the most adhered to debarment
8 agreement, that it is still not appealing enough to certain nations that may still be pro-nuclear
9 weapon use, and

10
11 **WORRIED** about leaving the abilities to inspect and test that countries are staying true to the
12 treaty lies mostly in the hands of one agency, the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA),
13 and

14
15 1.) **STRESSES** the need for more safeguards like the IAEA to confirm the data that the
16 previously listed agency had collected;

17
18 2.) **ENCOURAGES** that more than the 189 states that are currently a part of the arms
19 agreement join in on the efforts to use nuclear power peacefully and without conflict;

20
21 3.) **URGES** the nuclear weapon nations, United States, Russian Federation, China, the
22 United
23 Kingdom, and France, to work in accordance with the Reviews other states to come to
24 agreements concerning the final document at the conferences;

25
26 4.) **SUGGESTS** that the 5 year interval be changed to an interval that is more appropriate to
27 keep
28 up with the fast-paced arms races taking place within the foreign nations outside of the
29 NPT;

30
31 5.) **HOPES** that outlying countries with nuclear weapons soon join the treaty in order to be
32 in compliance with the states of the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons Treaty.

1 ACKNOWLEDGING that the NPT is the largest treaty in the history of the United Nations,
2 which goes to signify the importance of keeping it up to date, and
3

4 NOTING WITH DEEP CONCERN the fact that there are approximately 15,700 nuclear
5 warheads among only nine countries, and
6

7 NOTING FURTHER that the NPT was drafted in 1968 yet these countries still have their
8 weapons, and
9

- 10 1) EXPRESSES ITS HOPE that those states with possession of the nuclear warheads disarm
11 them correctly within the standards of International Atomic Energy Agency;
12
13 2) ACCEPTS stricter inspections of states to ensure the protection of the public, as long as
14 these inspections do not harm the rights of any nation;
15
16 3) RECOMENDS all countries to have a peaceful nuclear program for the enrichment of
17 their energy programs;
18
19 4) FURTHER RECOMENDS that all states especially small ones seek the necessary help,
20 whether it is from the IAEA or another state, to develop their program.

1 ALARMED by the estimated 10,144 nuclear weapons in existence as reported by the Stockholm
2 Peace Research Institute, and

3
4 NOTING WITH REGRET the devastation caused by nuclear weapons in Hiroshima and
5 Nagasaki in August of 1945, and

6
7 ANXIOUS to continue the work that the past agreements like the Nuclear Nonproliferation
8 Treaty, and

9
10 COGNIZANT of the concerns that nuclear states have pertaining to their current nuclear arsenal
11 and the tactical asset that nuclear weaponry provides, and

12
13 BELIEVING that continuing to lessen the quantity of nuclear weapons is the best way to
14 promote long term peace and stability around the world, and

15
16 REAFFIRMING its belief that a weapons of mass destruction free zone should be established in
17 the Middle East;

- 18
19 1) ENCOURAGES nations to continue to promote non-NPT members to adopt the
20 Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty if they have not done so already in the interest of
21 promoting continued reduction of this eminent threat;
22
23 2) ADVISES nations that are already members of the NPT to adopt the Additional
24 Protocol to the Comprehensive Safeguards Agreements;
25
26 3) SUGGESTS nations with economic power and influence consider sanctions to
27 nations who have not agreed to the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty;
28
29 4) RECOMMENDS continued transparency about current stockpile levels and continued
30 reduction of nuclear stockpiles to ensure the long time security.

1 Cognizant of previous resolution calling for the review of the Treaty on the Non-
2 Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons at five-year intervals, and

3
4 Recalling how dangerous and deadly these weapons can be on the civil populous
5 over both a long-term and short-term period, and

6
7 Deploring all nations to review their standpoints on Nuclear Non-Proliferation, and

8
9 Appreciating any reforms that nations would make to their existing nuclear power
10 plants to eliminate/reduce the dangers of nuclear meltdown, and

11
12 1) Expresses the hope that all nations would soon take part in this treaty on
13 Nuclear Non-Proliferation;

14
15 2) Stresses the importance of a truly United league of nations to educate the
16 world on the dangers of nuclear weapons;

17
18 3) Requests the Secretary-General to render the necessary assistance and to
19 provide such services, including summary records, as may be required for
20 the 2020 Review Conference of the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of
21 Nuclear Weapons and its Preparatory Committee.
