1 NOTING that drug trafficking is a rapidly compounding and frustrating problem on the
2 international agenda, and

3
4 AWARE THAT approximately 400 billion dollars per year are spent globally on the
5 illegal drug trade, placing it among oil and firearms as the world's most traded goods,
6 which illustrates the depth of the global problem, and

7
8 REALIZING that international coordination is essential to making any progress towards
9 solving this dangerous global problem, and

10
11 RECOGNIZING with concern that drug trafficking and the crime associated with it is
12 expanding rapidly into regions such as West Africa, and

13
14 APPLAUDING the cooperative international efforts put into previous conventions
15 devoted to the control of legal and illicit drug trade, such as the UN Convention Against
16 Illicit Traffic in Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances in 1988, among others, and

17
18 AFFIRMING previous actions of the United Nations to combat illicit drug trade, such as
19 the UNODC-WCO Container Control Program, which aims to train national governments
20 to better control the shipment of drugs through their countries;

21
22 1) ADVISES the United Nations to increase support for countries in those regions
23 in which drug trafficking is a growing threat to international security;

24
25 2) IMPLORES the member nations to cooperate with each other to better solve
26 this huge global crisis;

27
28 3) SUGGESTS a new convention on illicit drug trade be held in 2015 to
29 encourage and enable international cooperation on possible solutions to the drug
30 problem.

- 1 Considering that many nations have put into effect laws or regulations to prevent drug trafficking
2 and organized crime, and
3
4 Cognizant of the fact that drug trafficking and organized crime are rising at an alarming rate in
5 many nations, and
6
7 Applauding the UNODC (United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime) and nations in
8 cooperation with them for their work against drug trafficking and organized crime, and
9
10 Appreciating that the UNODC provides a World Drug Report that works to improve the
11 understanding of member states about illicit drug trends, and
12
13 Noting with grave concern that many member states are bordered by nations that are producing
14 illicit drugs, and
15
16 Aware of the fact that some countries do not have the means to instill preventative measures, and
17
18 1) Suggests member states keep detailed records of data related to illicit drugs that could
19 be of use to the UNODS when they are creating the World Drug Report;
20
21 2) Recommends that member states who do not have laws regarding drug trafficking and
22 organized crime attempt to pass regulation in an attempt to hinder it;
23
24 3) Encourages member states to work together since some member states may have
25 stronger technology or military tactics that could aid in the prevention of drug
26 trafficking and organized crime;
27
28 4) Requests that member states attempt to strengthen their borders to try to prevent drug
29 trafficking.

1 Regretfully stating there has been significant growth in the illicit trafficking of drugs, people,
2 firearms, and natural resources in the past decade, trafficking in these and other commodities is
3 generally characterized by high levels of organization and the presence of strong criminal groups
4 and networks involved in such activities and while such activities existed in the past, both the
5 scale and the geographic scope of the current challenge are unprecedented in 2009, the value of
6 illicit trade around the globe was estimated at US\$1.3 trillion and is increasing drug trafficking
7 has particularly severe implications because of the vast illegal profits it generates: an estimated
8 322 billion dollars a year,
9

10 Acknowledging that steps have been taken by the United Nations to attempt cutting down drug
11 trafficking and organized crime an many resolutions and a number of international conventions
12 on cutting back organized crime such as the UN Convention against Transnational Organized
13 Crime (UNTOC) and its protocols on human trafficking, migrant smuggling and trafficking of
14 firearms,
15

16 Urging for help to be offered for countries who are particularly vulnerable to organized
17 crime because weak and fragile countries are particularly susceptible to the effects of
18 transnational organized crime these countries, some devastated by war, others making the
19 complex journey towards democracy, are victimized and as a result, organized crime
20 flourishes, successes in development are reversed, and it is estimated that up to US\$40
21 billion annually is lost through corruption in developing countries,
22

23 Striving to keep regulations in place to cut back on organized crime and drug trafficking
24 and help be provided to countries who have been effected heavily by this issue.

- 7 Acknowledging the action already taken to combat organized crime and the many social and
- 8 economic problems that come with it and the programs in place around the world to prevent
- 9 young people from using and abusing narcotics, and
- 10
- 11 Noting with Grave Concern the actions (and inactions) by certain to harbor and/or encourage
- 12 drug trafficking and organized crime;
- 13
- 14 1) Suggests the continuation of programs meant to deter young people from drugs,
- 15 gangs, crime organizations on the national and international levels;

- 17 2) Implores the cooperation of all nations in attempts to stamp out organized crime and
- 18 drug trafficking;

- 20 3) Promotes the formation of a special committee to oversee actions related to and
- 21 including the subject matters;

- 23 4) Stresses that organized crime and drug trafficking hurt all nations and all people and
- 24 international cooperation must occur in order to take action.

1 **Recognizing** that in the past century drug trafficking and organized crime rates have risen due to
2 easier access to communications systems, such as: telephones and computers, and
3

4 **Realizing** the need to lower the rates of drug trafficking and organized crime because over the
5 past decade it has caused millions of unnecessary deaths that have led to riots in many nations
6 around the world, and
7

8 **Noting with grave concern** that many countries have not made an attempt to curb the amount of
9 drug trafficking and organized crime because these countries feel that this is a part of society and
10 there is nothing that they can do to control it, and
11

12 **Expressing deep concern** that in the past four years over 35,000 people have died from drug
13 wars and the organized crime in these areas have increased because many criminals make money
14 off paid homicide and rape from drug trafficking leaders, and
15

16 **Appreciating** the passage of the “legalize and control” policy in certain countries so it is
17 possible to control how many drugs are sent through a country on any certain day or in a certain
18 year because there is a smaller amount of need to hide the drugs that are being processed and less
19 organized crime is needed because fewer people are competing on what would be considered a
20 black market:
21

- 22 1. **Stresses** the need for all countries to adopt the “legalize and control” policy so they can
23 control the amount of drugs being processed in the country at one time;
24
- 25 2. **Recommends** that the committee create an bi-annual international summit to review
26 increases or decreases in drug trafficking and organized crime rates to decide what needs
27 to be done to lower these rates;
28
- 29 3. **Urges** that the committee cultivate sanctions on countries that know of drug trafficking
30 and organized crime because of drug busts and imprisonments but do not do anything to
31 solve the problem and let the criminals off with a warning;
32
- 33 4. **Reaffirms its belief** that if stronger sanctions are made and a summit is created, drug
34 trafficking and organized crime can be abolished from the earth.

1 NOTING WITH GRAVE CONCERN the international disorder and turmoil brought about by
2 organized crime, specifically, but not confined to, drug or sex trafficking organizations, and
3

4 OBSERVING the fact that the drug cartels within the United Mexican States are among the most
5 pressing of current crime organizations, and that the many groups involved are willing to act
6 very violently and irrationally to maintain power, and
7

8 NOTING WITH APPROVAL the attempts that have been and are being made by both the
9 governments of the United States of America and Mexico to uproot and destroy the cartels and
10 crime organizations within their borders, and
11

12 REALIZING the sex trafficking and counter-governmental organizations similar to those in
13 Mexico within many areas of Africa, as well as all around the world, and
14

15 EMPHASIZING a requirement for international security, and not just a security that benefits the
16 permanent members of the United Nations Security Council, and a requirement for universal
17 human rights;
18

19 1) CALLS UPON the United Nations, and all members thereof, to combat not only drug
20 cartels, but also sex traffickers, paramilitary forces, terrorist groups, and any other parties
21 willing to obstruct peace and order to gain power;
22

23 2) EXPRESSES THE BELIEF that peace is the best route to take, and that even very
24 hateful organizations are not necessarily immovable on their policies;
25

26 3) RECOGNIZES that some enemies are immovable in their beliefs and believe their
27 best interests are all others' first priority, therefore removing the ability to reason or find
28 agreement with them;
29

30 4) RECOMMENDS the use of non-UN counter-terrorist and police groups to pacify,
31 most preferably without the use of lethal tactics, any groups that are violent towards
32 citizens for any reason, and to detain any offenders until such time as a trial may take
33 place in the country they committed the crime;
34

35 5) APPEALS to all nations united within this establishment that they might work
36 together to remove the threats of organized crime from our world.

1 EMPHASIZING The fact that drug trafficking continues to be a growing problem and is not
2 getting enough attention in the south African society, and

3
4 STRESSING That citizens are being killed due to gangs organized around the production and
5 distribution of illegal substances, and

6
7 EMPHASIZING FURTHER In the last 2 years, arrests due to the possession of illegal drugs has
8 risen 35 percent, and

9
10 ACKNOWLEDGING The actions of organized crime groups such as gangs are resulting in a
11 sharp rise in the poaching of already endangered wildlife, such as rhinos in Southern Africa, as
12 discussed in the inaugural edition of the NEW UNODC Bulletin on Organized Crime in
13 Southern Africa, and

14
15 DECLARING the street value of rhino horn has skyrocketed to \$65,000/kg, against
16 \$52,000/kg of gold at current spot prices, and

17
18 CONSIDERING The fear of poachers is reducing the number of tourists to rhino farms and
19 therefore decreasing their capital, and

20
21 1) SUGGESTS That the UN will enforce the importance of correcting the drug trafficking
22 in South Africa;

23
24 2) PROMOTES Continued work with the UNCAC (United Nations Convention Against
25 Corruption) Coalition to host a training workshop for civil society organizations on the
26 Review Mechanism;

27
28 3) IMPLORES The police department employs more officers to better protect society and
29 better control the problem;

30
31 4) ENCOURAGES the local government to establish more rehab facilities so the demand
32 for illegal substances will decrease;

33
34 5) PROMOTES Establishing an appropriately structured legal trading regime for rhino horn
35 may provide an effective and lasting solution to the rhino poaching problem.

1 DEPLORING the production and distribution of illegal drugs in Colombia, which has 2
resulted in a separate social class designated by four major drug trafficking cartels, the 3
Medellín, Cali, Norte del Valle, and North Coast coteries, and

4
5 EMPHASIZING Colombia’s role as the world’s largest cocaine producer, and

6
7 APPRECIATING Colombia’s reduction in cocaine production by 60% in the year 2010 8
and it’s halved level of drug-related violence in the past 10 years, and

9
10 EXPRESSING DEEP CONCERN for the Colombian drug cartels’ retaliation by
11 murdering no less than the five presidential candidates Luis Carlos Galán Sarmiento, 12
Jaime Pardo Leal, Bernardo Jaramillo Ossa, Alvaro Gómez Hurtado, and Carlos Pizarro,
13 Leongómez, by planning and financing the Palace of Justice siege that left 11 of the 25
14 Supreme Court Justices dead, by killing over 3,000 members of Union Patriótica, a 15
Colombian political party, and by assassinating countless policemen, judges, and 16
witnesses;

17
18 1) SUPPORTS the United States and European countries providing financial, 19
logistical, tactical, and military aid to the Colombian government to implement 20
plans to combat the illegal drug trade as part of the establishment of the War on 21
Drugs;

22
23 2) APPLAUDS the Colombian and United States governments for coinciding 24
their efforts through extradition, allowing Colombian drug traffickers to be put on 25
trial in the United States for their crimes, and in doing so, disorganizing organized 26
crime;

27
28 3) INVITES other governments throughout the world, in addition to the 29
Colombian administration to impose harsher penalties for users and dealers, 30
making people afraid to commit the offense in the first place;

31
32 4) CALLS UPON the Colombian government to eliminate the country’s 33
dependence upon cocaine within its economy by clearing the palatinate’s coca 34
fields so there is no trace of drugs and by replacing the crop with other forms of 35
produce to create a different way of life for Colombia’s farmers, and to educate 36
the country’s denizens as a whole.

1 **CONCERNED** that Afghanistan's opium economy is an estimated 36% of their GDP, and

2
3 **AWARE** that the opium production creates transnational drug trafficking related problems that
4 impact the stability of the state, society, and politics, and

5
6 **COGNIZANT** of the jobs and revenue created in rural areas due to the production of opium, and

7
8 **EXPRESSING DEEP CONCERN** that the illegal production and sale of drugs directly affects
9 the neighboring states economies and societies, and

10
11 **CONSCIOUS** that 95% of the world's opium is produced in Afghanistan and smuggled into
12 neighboring countries before it reaches its final destination, and

13
14 **TAKING NOTE** of the efforts made by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime
15 (UNODC) to prevent future production and sale of opium such as the 1961 Single Convention on
16 Narcotic Drugs and the 1971 Convention on Psychotropic Substances;

- 17
18 1) **CALLS UPON** member states to increase intelligence and information gathering to
19 further combat the smuggling of drugs into neighboring countries and investigate
20 transnational organized crime;
- 21
22 2) **URGES** the formation of regional partnerships to counteract the sale and production
23 of drugs;
- 24
25 3) **INVITES** member states to provide financial and technical assistance through the
26 UNODC to provide law enforcement agencies with specialized equipment and
27 training needed to detect and combat trafficking;
- 28
29 4) **WELCOMES** the creation of a conference specifically designed to address the
30 concerns of cultivation and production of opium in rural areas;
- 31
32 5) **REQUESTS** that banks and financial institutions investigate the transfers of funds to
33 further prevent money laundering and other illegal means of obtaining funds;
- 34
35 6) **SUGGESTS** that member states create a database to track international drug cartels
36 and organized crime groups.

1 RECOGNIZING that organized crime is a threat to the peace and security of a nation and its
2 citizens, violates human rights, damages economic and social development, and
3

4 RECALLING the purpose of the United Nations as stated in the charter: “To maintain
5 international peace and security, and to that end: to take effective collective measures for the
6 prevention and removal of threats to the peace, and for the suppression of acts of aggression or
7 other breaches of the peace...and in conformity with the principles of justice and international
8 law, adjustment or settlement of ... situations which might lead to a breach of the peace” and
9

10 OBSERVING that such these crimes are diverse and have expanded to an international level,
11 especially drug and human trafficking, cyber crimes, and money laundering, making it more
12 difficult to track, apprehend, and punish criminals; not only within the general population but
13 within large businesses and governments, fueling corruption and negligence, thus undermining
14 legitimate businesses and governments of honest and hard –working citizens, and
15

16 NOTING that there is no universal definition of “transnational organized crime”, as to allow for
17 a broader utilization of the Organized Crime Convention (2003), though the term “organized
18 criminal group” is defined in the former and a vast majority of transnational organized crime
19 groups can be categorized in the latter;
20

21
22 REQUESTS the formation of a committee of financially able, willing, and politically
23 stable nations to collaborate in observing and tracking the movements and operations of
24 known and suspected organized crime groups, as to more comprehensively fight such
25 crimes nationally and internationally,
26

27 SUGGESTS victim support and witness protection to victims of human trafficking and
28 individuals and their families that may require it as a result of threats or persecution by
29 organized criminal groups in order to make cooperation in combating complex crimes
30 less problematic,
31

32 FURTHER INVITES nations to review, sign, and ratify the United Nations Convention
33 Against Transnational and Organized Crime and its three supplements in an expedient
34 manner as to protect and save lives damaged by the multiple aspects of organized crime,
35 reduce rates of serious crimes that are related to organized crime groups, and further
36 promote cooperation between nations in combating these problems.

1 **Recognizing that** Afghanistan is the leading producer of poppies in the world, which are then
2 used to produce opium and subsequently heroin, and

3 **Taking into account that** the poppies, which are produced in Afghanistan and used to create
4 opium and heroin, are then sold to many people in other countries around the world, resulting in
5 negative effects in these countries, and

6 **Acknowledging that** producing revenue and providing for the wellbeing of its citizens, along
7 with the existence of Afghanistan's industry, is based on agriculture in Afghanistan.

8 **Keeping in mind that** the use of opium and heroin in Afghanistan has been steadily increasing,
9 furthering the problems of HIV and AIDS, and

10 **Realizing that** many Afghans are turning to opium and heroin as a way to escape the social and
11 economic turmoil of everyday life, and

12 **Noting that** detoxification and drug substitution efforts have been enacted by the Afghan
13 government, but that the relapse rate for these patients seeking aid through detoxification is
14 around 92%, whereas the relapse rate for patients being treated through the use of methadone
15 substitution is around 17-25%;

- 16
- 17 1. **Resolving** to create more detoxification centers around the country focused on
18 helping local Afghans fight their opium and heroin addictions;
 - 19 2. **Encouraging** further the use of methadone substitution, a method that although has
20 been controversial, has been proven effective in many heroin addicts;
 - 21 3. **Urging** the Afghan government to increase its antinarcotic operations to reduce the
22 amount of opium and heroin present in Afghan society;
 - 23 4. **Replacing** the illicit opium and heroin trade with the sale of licensed opium and
24 heroin to produce legal medicines such as morphine and codeine;
 - 25 5. **Recommending that** the Afghan government applies more of its resources to
26 burgeoning the farming industry of major food crops such as corn, rice, barley, wheat,
27 vegetables, fruits, and nuts and the industrial crops such as cotton, tobacco, madder,
28 castor beans, and sugar beets.

6 result in an escalation of the 5.conflict and many more deaths, and
7

8 **REALIZING** that in order the stabilize the region, a peaceful solution may be superior to a
9 military one, and
10

11 **EMPHASIZING** the growing need tot bring this conflict to a close not only for the safety and

24 betterment of the nation of Afghanistan and the world as well.

6 Recognizing previous efforts of the United Nations to bring aid to those suffering from the effects of
7 turmoil in Afghanistan, such as the bringing of aid (food, vaccinations, and education) to more than 1.3
8 million devastated Afghan citizens in 2000, and

9
10 Commends Afghanistan's current efforts in the reformation of their government, and

11
12 Stressing, however, the need for human rights in Afghanistan, such as the lack of women's rights and
13 availability of education to many children, especially girls, and

14
15 Welcoming all developments in Afghanistan which will help supply these rights and freedoms, such as
16 education, which are currently hindered by the consequences of terrorism in the nation, and

17
18 Emphasizing that although international forces will offer aid, they are striving to get out of the country
19 after supplying all that they can in order to support the removal of terrorism and other negative issues in
20 Afghanistan while continuing the development of human rights that are currently lacking in the country,
21 and

22
23 Noting the Afghan parties' pledge to the Bon Agreement which stated they would withdraw all military
24 units from Kabul, and

- 25
26 1) Suggests that all neighboring states and members of the International Security Assistance
27 force to take part in the upholding of peace and security in Afghanistan;
28
29 2) Calls Upon Afghan parties' to union with the International Security Assistance Force with
30 their pledge to withdraw military units from Kabul;
31
32 3) Requests that a fund be put in place that will contribute to those member nations of the
33 International Security Assistance Force's aid towards overcoming the current complications
34 in Afghanistan;
35
36 4) Encourages these member nations and neighboring states to contribute to this fund in order
37 to reach the fullest potential of the International Security Assistance Force's aid to
38 Afghanistan;
39
40 5) Promotes that more efforts be put in place to make education readily available to those
41 children currently not able to go to school in the nation, including girls.

1 MINDFUL that conflict in Afghanistan and throughout the Middle East is affecting many
2 aspects of nations' well beings, and

3
4 REALIZING that Operation Enduring Freedom has proven to be a time-consuming operation
5 without a definite conclusion, and

6
7 COGNIZANT that the Afghan conflict does not possess the goal of defeating a single nation but
8 terrorist groups that may be within them, and

9
10 ACKNOWLEDGING that most of the contribution of troops is being provided by the United
11 States of America and its allies, and

12
13 RECOGNIZING that efforts are being made with the intent to prevent the spread of terrorism by
14 placing focus on Afghanistan, and

15
16 TAKING INTO ACCOUNT that the spread of terrorist groups may continue if full United Nations
17 attention is not given to peacefully put an end to terroristic activity throughout the world.

19 1) STRESSES that any added assistance by other nations or and the United Nations by
20 means of capital, personnel, or other resources is vital towards peacekeeping efforts in
21 Afghanistan, and

23 2) URGES member nations to put their focus on the Afghan conflict before solving global
24 issues of lesser importance, and
- 25
26 3) STONGLY SUGGESTS that a United Nations establish a subcommittee with the intent
27 of allowing Afghan leaders to gain full control of policing their county through a peaceful
28 transition of power, and

30 4) EXPRESSES THE HOPE that an annual summit be held at a neutral location, with all
31 United Nations members in attendance, to report on the progress and needs of the Middle
32 East with emphasis on nations such as Afghanistan.
