2 45,000+ cases known cases of cybercrimes today and this is becoming a  
3 serious problem is was not before.

5 **Keeping in mind** Espionage is the practice of spying or hiring spies to gain  
6 political and military information, and

7  
8 **Having heard** the Espionage Act of 1998 took place to create a solution for this  
9 international espionage, and

10  
11 **Noting further** it clearly states if someone takes or destroys a trade secret of  
12 value with the intention of using it to give the foreign power the advantage, and

13  
14 **Noting with deep concern** in the past years some countries have turned to

16

19  
20 2) **Declaring** that espionage is a serious problem so do not spread valuable  
21 information over electronics for example: social media, texting, IMing,  
22 phone calls or voicemails;

23  
24 3) **Recommend Against** sending valuable information through a letter.  
25 Along the way to its destination it can be opened and looked at;

26  
27 4) **Taking note of** sometimes someone gives clues they are performing  
28 espionage but do not jump to conclusions. If someone is acting really  
29 protective and distant, or the opposite they are more involved. These are  
30 some of the signs of an espionage performer.

2 this controversial topic, and

3  
4 TAKING NOTE that International Espionage is the process in which human agents extract  
5 information about plans and activities that are not available to the public from other countries,  
6 companies, or individuals through covert means, and

7  
8 BEARING IN MIND that over 100 billion dollars was the approximate losses from corporate  
9 espionage, which is one the most popular forms of espionage in 2013, and

10  
11 STRESSING that in the past few years, there has been a 71 percent increase in terrorists attacks  
12 and a significant rise in deaths all around the planet and both have the possibility to rise more,  
13 and

14  
15 REALIZING that espionage agencies target illegal drug trade and terrorists as well as state  
16 actors, these agencies value certain intelligence collection techniques over others, and

17  
18 EMPHASIZING It should not be assumed that espionage is always directed at the most secret  
19 operations of a target country, national and terrorist organizations and other groups are also  
20 targets because governments want to retrieve information that they can use to be proactive in  
21 protecting their nation from potential terrorist attacks, and

- 22  
23 1) INVITES all nations to improve international relations in order to increase  
24 international trust to overcome this problem;  
25  
26 2) REAFFIRMS the right to privacy and not to be subjected to arbitrary or unlawful  
27 interference with privacy, family, home or correspondence, and the right to enjoy  
28 protection of the law against such interference or attacks;  
29  
30 3) RECOGNIZES the global and open nature of the Internet as a driving force in  
31 accelerating progress towards development in its various forms and that the same  
32 rights that people have offline must also be protected online, in particular the right  
33 to privacy, including in the context of the surveillance of communications;  
34  
35 4) REQUESTS the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights to present  
36 an interim report on the issue of human rights and indiscriminate surveillance.

22 2) CALLS UPON all member nations set a firm solution to this devastating issue by  
23 forming an international group to protect data and promote peaceful communication  
24 between all nations, ensuring trust between nations and ending espionage;  
25  
26 3) EMPHASIZES the importance of peaceful, direct communication, the only  
27 permanent way to successfully end international espionage.

7 **Taking into Consideration** the fact that France currently has 3,200 troops deployed in Iraq,  
8 many of whom have been deployed in the last year, and

6  
7 WORRIED the recent capture of 52 155mm M198 Howitzers from U.S.  
8 forces and the recent capture of an estimated 100-150 armored vehicles by ISIS  
9 forces, and  
10  
11 DISTURBED by the recent killings of two Iraqi generals in a suicide attack  
12 performed by ISIS militants in two American-made Humvees rigged with explosives,  
13 and  
14  
15 AWARE OF the danger ISIS poses to Iraq's cities as they now have enough resources  
16 to present a immediate threat, and  
17  
18 REGRETFUL of the killings of minorities such as, Christians, Yazidis and Turkmen in  
19 Iraq by ISIS;  
20  
21 1.) ENDORSES Resolution 2170 and Resolution 1373, which both  
21 condemn the recruitment of new forces by ISIS and stop the funding of  
22 terrorist groups by any person or persons;  
23  
24 2.) URGES nations that have forces in Iraq to be more combat-ready, as to prevent  
25 the capture of artillery in future engagements with ISIS;  
26  
27 3.) REQUESTS Iraq and other financially able nations increase the defenses  
28 around major cities like Baghdad Iraq's capital which is in severe danger as ISIS  
29 has captured Ramadi which is only 110 kilometers away.

22 not to be punished accordingly;  
23
- 24 2) **STRESSES** that all other countries follow through with the agreements of the CWC  
25 and discourage all countries who still have deadly biological weapons;  
26
- 27 3) **DRAWS ATTENTION TO** the deadliness of chemical weapons in World War I and  
28 II and imagines the deadliness of modern weapons in modern warfare for not only  
29 military personal but also civilians;  
30
- 31 4) **INVITES** all countries to join a movement away from the use and stockpiling of  
32 chemical weapons no matter the situation internally or externally of the country  
33 whether it be riots or warfare;  
34
- 35 5) **REITERATES** that under the control of any power, big or small, chemical weapons  
36 can have devastating effects on all people at any time no matter their status or  
37 position.

1 EMPHASIZING- the fact that the Syrian government used chemical weapons upon several  
2 civilians and rebels.

3  
4 STRESSING- the total elimination of all lethal chemicals weapons worldwide and they must not  
5 be used in any situation regardless of the circumstances.

6  
7 FULLY ACKNOWLEDGING- the effort put forth by the United Nations to eliminate chemical  
8 weapons from modern warfare.

9  
10 NOTING WITH DEEP CONCERN- the use of chemical weapons is banned and should not be  
11 used in any circumstances by any governments due to the Conference on Disarmament in  
12 Geneva on September 3, 1992.

15 further use should result in punishment.

6 FULLY ACKNOWLEDGING the steps that nations and organization such as the OPCW have  
7 made to prevent a large chemical weapons attack like what happened in Syria in 2013 when the  
8 Syrian government used sarin nerve gas against civilians and rebels alike, and

10 CONDEMNING all nations that still have large stock piles of chemical weapons such as chlorine,  
11 sarin, and other harmful weapons outlawed by the OPCW, and

12  
13 EMPHASIZING that all chemical weapons are a threat to world peace and the United Nations  
14 should do everything in its power to prevent chemical weapons from being used on civilians or  
15 soldiers ever again;

17 1) STRESSES the importance of having inspectors that check for violations of the  
18 rules of the United Nations and other organizations concerning the use, storage,  
19 production, or stockpiling of chemical weapons in labs and military facilities of  
20 member states especially those that are suspected of breaking regulations;  
21  
22 2) SUGGEST economic sanctions be encouraged by the United Nations on nations  
23 that do not follow the chemical weapons rules and regulations made by the United  
24 Nations and OPCW;  
25  
26 3) ENCOURAGES research to be done by the United Nations member states into  
27 ways to safely destroy chemical weapons;  
28  
29 4) FURTHER ENCOURAGES research to be done to find ways to safely treat  
30 people injured by a chemical weapons attack and to find ways to safely clean up  
31 chemicals after an attack;

33 5) PROMOTES cooperation between countries in dealing with chemical weapons  
34 issues and attacks by creating stricter rules and regulations concerning chemical  
35 weapons that have strict consequences such as economic sanctions, trade

**AWARE** that 19 countries around the world currently either possess or are suspected of possessing chemical weapons, and

**CONSCIOUS** of the two recent chemical weapons attacks, known as the Ghouta and Khal al-asal attacks, on the civilians of Syria in the suburbs of Damascus and Aleppo in 2013, and

**TAKING INTO ACCOUNT** that there are already two successful means of eliminating chemical weapons, being neutralization and incineration, and

**BEARING IN MIND** that the effects of chemical weapons on the environment will severely diminish the progress we have made in repairing it, and

**NOTING** that 12 countries are currently violating the guidelines of the Chemical Weapons Convention (CWC), and

**ALARMED** by the fact that the Chemical Weapons Convention has not done their part in enforcing Articles 1, 4, and 5;

- 1.) **SUGGESTS** that countries with chemical weapons or materials to create chemical weapons eliminate all chemical weapons material by any means possible;
- 2.) **RECOMMENDS** the use of sanctions on the Syrian government if they continue to violate the guidelines of the CWC;
- 3.) **REITERATES** the need for punishment, to be decided by the Security Council, for the noncompliant member nations that still choose to disobey the CWC;
- 4.) **URGES** the UN to create a summit to be held every 5 years to further discuss the possible strengthening of the CWC and to repair potential weak points in Articles 1, 4, and 5;
- 5.) **STRESSES** the creation of a research team to work towards further methods of eliminating chemical weapons;
- 6.) **CALLS UPON** member nations to take measures to ensure either that chemical weapons are eliminated, or if entirely necessary, that the chemical weapons do not harm the environment.
