8 the stabilization of central Africa and toward the training of troops to stabilize all surrounding
9 countries such as Uganda, the central African Republic, Zambia, Angola, and Congo, and
10

11 BELIEVING that the hostile forces occupying the DRC are using intimidation and rape to keep
12 the citizens of the DRC down and delaying the progress and stability of central Africa, and
13

14 CONFIDENT that with support from the UN a multitude of invaluable resources such as a river
15 system that could provide Hydro-electric power to not only the DRC but surrounding nations
16 such as the ones previously listed, adding that the DRC has around 80% of the world's cobalt
17 reserves that could be mined and used to aid the region economically and that cobalt;
18

19 1) REQUESTS aid from nations and or the UN to help push hostile military forces out of
20 the DRC so that precious mineral resources like Cobalt can be excavated from the DRC's
21 territory;
22

23 2) EXPRESSES THANKS to the United States of America for help training our military
24 forces and for assisting us economically;
25

26 3) URGES other nations to follow their example so that all of Central Africa may be
27 helped in the way that the DRC has;
28

29 4) SUGGESTS that a united front against hostile nations would prove effective and
30 would allow for the mining of the DRC and the overall wellbeing and stabilization of
31 Central Africa;

4 DEPLORING the fact that measles take the life of a child every minute in sub-Saharan Africa
5 when, according to the WHO, vaccines for measles cost \$1 per child, and

6
7 CONSCIOUS that more than 50% of Africans suffer from water-related diseases such as infant
8 diarrhea, dysentery, river blindness, cholera, etc., and

9
10 TAKING INTO ACCOUNT that though mosquito nets cost less than \$1, Malaria in Africa
11 accounts for 90% of global Malaria deaths, especially in the slums, and

12
13 EXPRESSING DEEP CONCERN over the fact that between 12 and 16 million African children
14 have been orphaned by HIV/AIDS, and

15
16 CONSIDERING the fact that most African slums do not possess access to pipe borne water,;

- 17
18 1) IMPLORES the United Nations to increased funding to countries through the World
19 Health Organization, especially of those in dire need of food and clean water;
20
21 2) URGES countries to spend less money on war and put the health of their people in
22 utmost importance financially and socially;
23
24 3) SUGGESTS the spread of information on how to avoid the contraction of HIV/AIDS
25 through government-run advertisements.

4

5 **Noting with deep concern** that many African countries lack strong governments and
6 constitutions that would allow for an accurate estimate of weapons, military power, and weapon
7 development programs, making disarmament necessary and difficult to determine,
8

9 **Concerned** by the fact that we cannot be sure of unstable countries nuclear capabilities and sheer
10 amounts of dangerous weapons these countries hold, and clearly worried about the gross lack of
11 cooperation from many countries,
12

13 **Emphasizing** the need for a control system to be put in place to protect not only African
14 countries, but also the rest of the world from possible havoc, and
15

16 **Grieved** at the thought that Africa holds countries that still have ten year old children in their
17 military, slave trade, and feuds between not only countries, but also tribes within a country, and
18

- 19 1) **Suggests** programs be put in place to quell political insurrections and mutinies that would
20 lead to even more disorder in the area;
21
- 22 2) **Promotes** that every country should have a constitution or loose set of laws that can be
23 used to provide a sense of stable government to countries who otherwise have none;
24
- 25 3) **Stresses** the need of the United Nations to monitor unstable countries weapon capabilities
26 nuclear and otherwise, and the distribution of these weapons to an official military
27 instead of rebel groups and protesters;
28
- 29 4) **Wishing** that the improvements listed above can provide a sense of security to these
30 countries and the world as a whole, and that dialogue between African nations can make
31 the continent more stable.

1 **POINTING** out the fact that, to achieve and sustain a more safe and peaceful environment in
2 Africa, more efforts must be taken to regulate the brokering and trade of small arms and
3 weapons, as to avoid the use of these weapons by criminal and terrorist organizations, and
4

5 **REFERRING** to the efforts of the Regional Centre on Small Arms in The Great Lakes Region
6 and Horn of Africa, as well as the Nairobi Protocol, which aims to “prevent, combat and
7 eradicate the illicit manufacturing of, trafficking in, possession and use of small arms and light
8 weapons in the sub-region,” and
9

10 **NOTING WITH DEEP CONCERN** the amount of criminal activity that has taken place as a
11 result of the illicit transfer of small arms and light weapons, as well as the effect that has had on
12 the sub-region, and
13

14 **RECALLING** that 60% of all homicides take place by way of firearm, and
15

16 **RECOGNIZING** the growing conflict within Northern Africa, ignited by demonstrations in
17 states such as Egypt, Lybia, and Tunisia, taking into consideration the effects that these
18 demonstrations may have on the citizens of surrounding nations, and
19

20 **REALIZING** that the nations of Africa must cooperate and work together to regulate the
21 brokering and trade of small arms and weapons, as to prevent further violence and turmoil, and
22

23 **CONFIDENT** in the abilities of the citizens of the many nations of Africa,
24

- 25 1.) Suggests that there be more laws established that correspond with the licensing
26 to manufacture, sell, purchase, and operate small arms;
27
- 28 2.) Encourages the use of a single cooperative database through advanced
29 software with aims to identify, investigate, and eventually prosecute offenders;
30
- 31 3.) Implores the establishment of specific committees and organizations within
32 each nation to create and propose legislature with regards to the issue, and to
33 enforce the laws that have been established.

9 helping to solve the food and water shortages, and

10
11 Noting with grave concern that the worst of the effects of this drought could have been avoided
12 since many knew beforehand that this drought was going to be devastating to African people,
13 and

14
15 Considering that little was done a year ago to try building support to avoid a crisis even when it
16 was clear that the drought was becoming worse throughout the year, and

- 17
18
19 1) Requests that able nations put forth attempts to aid the people of Africa in obtaining
20 food and water to help them survive this drought;
21
22 2) Supports the refugee camps set up in Africa to help the people attain food and water
23 in crises such as this one;
24
25 3) Urges the government and/or other organizations to establish more refugee camps
26 since people have to travel immense distances to get to one of the ones already set up;
27
28 4) Expresses its appreciation to those who have already lent a hand in trying to assist the
29 African people in resolving this food crisis;
30
31 5) Recommends that with future droughts or crises, more effort is taken beforehand to
32 avoid the crisis or to at least alleviate some of the suffering the people.

7 MINDFUL of the ongoing dispute in Libya between forces loyal to Muammar Gaddafi and
8 forces supporting the National Transitional Council, and
9

10 REALIZING the possibility of more revolts in nations throughout Africa due to poor living
11 conditions, poor economies, and desperate citizens, in underdeveloped nations, and
12

13 TAKING NOTE of the terrorist attack on the United Nations complex in the capital of Nigeria in
14 August leaving dozens injured or deceased, and
15

16 AWARE of the threat to international security should this unrest in Africa continue to go
17 unchecked;
18

- 19 1) URGES more resources to be put towards the current peacekeeping operations in
20 Africa along with more peacekeeping troops to increase the stability in these nations,
21 and also the sense of security by the citizens;
22
- 23 2) REQUESTS the disarmament of unstable nations throughout Africa to eliminate the
24 potential for even more bloodshed;
25
- 26 3) EXPRESSES THE HOPE that the ongoing disputes within nations throughout Africa
27 are put to an end, and that the widespread, poor, living conditions in Africa are
28 improved;
29
- 30 4) EMPHASIZES the importance of eliminating any international security threats in

1 STRESSING the fact that an increasing amount of unrest in the African nations has been
2 observed since the 1990s and that this unrest has increased recently, and

3
4 AWARE of the fact that, even though some of this warfare is conducted in a civil manner, most
5 skirmishes are conducted between armed groups that follow no civil code or law, therefore they
6 make peaceful disarmament difficult, and

7
8 EXPRESSING GREAT CONCERN that the results and aftermath of these battles between civil
9 and non-civil armed groups fighting for resources in the African continent lead to tens of
10 thousands of deaths that occur and accumulate each year , and

11
12 RECOGNIZING the fact that most armed groups are fighting over resources such as fertile land,
13 food, clean water, or controlled substances such as narcotics which are commonly trafficked and
14 grown in the African continent, and

15
16 TAKING INTO ACCOUNT the fact that United Nations aid has been supplied to poorer African
17 countries already, to prevent the deaths of many more suffering from famine, injury, and disease
18 caused by this onslaught of warfare;

19
20 1) SUGGESTS that to eliminate armed violence in Africa, aid must be sent to those living
21 in poverty and famine in the African nations, as well as those with disease, so they may no
22 longer lack proper nutrition;

23
24 2) SUPPORTS any program or nation helping to access greater amounts of water in the
25 whole of the African continent to quench the thirst of hundreds of thousands without
26 sufficient water supply;

27
28 3) NOTES WITH APPROVAL towards any nation aiding African nations with irrigation
29 assistance for inland farms and crop yield enhancers, along with more advanced crop
30 genetics;

31
32 4) REQUESTS that an attempt be made to try and eliminate the trafficking of controlled
33 substances such as narcotics, along with the groups that produce these body-damaging
34 substances, in the region as well as the growing of these substances by the nations of the
35 world as a whole.

1 **Recognizing** that the term “Decolonization” refers to the undoing of the relationship in which a
2 territory is dependent upon and governed by a foreign colonial power, and
3

4 **Believing** that all people have the basic right to determine their own political status and to freely
5 pursue their own economic, social, and cultural interests, and
6

7 **Endorsing** the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples,
8 which states “The subjection of peoples to alien subjugation, domination and exploitation
9 constitutes a denial of fundamental human rights, is contrary to the Charter of the United Nations
10 and is an impediment to the promotion of world peace and co-operation,” and
11

12 **Commending** the collective efforts of United Nations member states, which have helped 80
13 former colonies gain their independence and freed more than 700 million people since the UN
14 was founded in 1945, and
15

16 **Appreciating** the work of the UN Special Committee on Decolonization, which monitors the
17 situation in the remaining 16 territories, and strives to facilitate their advance towards
18 independence, and
19

20 **Mindful** that the period from 2011-2020 has been declared the Third International Decade for
21 the Eradication of Colonialism, and
22

23 **Stressing** that there is still much work to be done and that the UN cannot lay the issue of
24 decolonization to rest until every colony that wishes to be independent has achieved that status,
25 and
26

27 **Confident** that with continued work, all territories will be able to enjoy complete independence
28 and freedom;
29

30 1) **Invites** all colonies and territories to continue seeking their independence from foreign
31 powers;
32

33 2) **Stresses** that political, economic, social or educational unpreparedness should never
34 serve as a pretext for delaying independence;
35

36 3) **Calls upon** states in control of territories that wish to become independent take
37 immediate and decisive steps towards the transfer of power to the people of that region.

5 protection from armed conflicts," and that most countries have undertaken to comply with this,
6 and

7
8 Accepting that countries in the United Nations, including Norway, and also UNICEF have
9 recognized this issue and provided some protocol that stated that the youngest age for a soldier
10 must be eighteen years old, and

11
12 Concerned that even with documents in effect, some areas in these impoverished countries are
13 doing nothing to help these children, and

14
15 Understanding that these countries do not have a stable government to protect these abused
16 children and that the effect on them impacts them and society in general, and

17
18 Draws attention to the fact that if most if not all of the countries involved in the United
19 Nations would join together and fund the militias of these unstable countries so that
20 actual soldiers could be deployed;

21
22 Demands that a force of deployment should be put together and sent to help the relief
23 effort to pull children from battle and help them;

24
25 Requests that any appeals for humanitarian services for this crisis to any country should
26 be responded to with much thought and consideration;

27
28 Expresses the belief that with much effort, reorganization, and compassion, the stable
29 countries of the United Nations can make solving this problem an actual reality.

2 the town of Cliché, North Korea Oct. 16, 2006, and
3

4 BEARING IN MIND the nuclear device had a yield of between 10 and 20 kilotons (TNT
5 equivalent), close to the yield of Hiroshima and Nagasaki bombings in 1945, and
6

7 NOTING WITH GRAVE CONCERN that North Korea's involvement in nuclear
8 weapons test has raised much controversy and confusion among the masses, and
9

10 TAKING INTO ACCOUNT that North Korea maintains uranium mines with an
11 estimated four million tons of exploitable high-quality uranium ore; resources to fuel
12 these weapons seem limitless, and
13

14 AWARE of these tests, many nations around the world, and even allies of North Korea
15 question the need for these tests for no real present danger has risen, and
16

17 HAVING CONSIDERED the results from these tests, military defenses from every
18 nation has tightened and prepared itself for the worst nuclear confrontation in history;
19

20 1) REQUESTS abandoning these tests and channeling the uranium resources to a
21 more energy constructive field of research, or negotiate with other nations on the
22 topic of using this well of uranium for global needs;
23

24 2) URGES more communication with other nations to use these resources for
25 progressive growth in energy savings;
26

27 3) STRONGLY ENCOURAGES collaborating with other nations on new nuclear
28 technological advancements and researching for the goal of improving global
29 economics and industry;
30

31 4) SUGGESTS the establishment of an NGO which will have multiple stations
32 inserted in countries to monitor with their consent;
33

34 4) PROMOTES peaceful use for this nuclear energy, and emphasize the ban of
35 nuclear weapons production for every nation.

2 world, non-communicable diseases are a widespread epidemic, and

3
4 AWARE that the biggest killers are no longer contagious diseases, such as HIV and
5 AIDS or Malaria, but rather chronic ailments, such as lung disease, cancer, and
6 diabetes, and

7
8 SADDENED those non-communicable diseases now account for two out of every
9 three deaths worldwide, and

10
11 EXPRESSING DEEP CONCERN that a lack of exercise, overeating of junk food,
12 and use of alcohol are leading to the non-communicable diseases growing problem,
13 and

14
