<u>CONCERNED</u> that out of the top five early warning systems in the African region only the Famine Early Warning Systems Network and the Food Security and Nutrition Working Group predicted the famine in East Africa, and

EMPHASIZING the statement that Oxfam America, a global organization working to right the wrongs of poverty, hunger, and injustice, made saying, "While severe drought has undoubtedly led to the huge scale of the disaster, this crisis has been caused by people and policies, as much as by weather patterns. If more action had been taken earlier it could have helped mitigate the severity of the current crisis. It is no coincidence that the worst affected areas are those suffering from entrenched poverty due to marginalization and lack of investment," and

RECALLING how Al-Shabaab, a militant group, interference in emergency aid and contributions from donor countries attempting to assist the territories experiencing the famine dramatically hindered the external support process, and

NOTING WITH GRAVE CONCERN that malnourished people spend days traveling to overcrowded refugee camps and many do not survive the journey;

- 1) **RECOMMENDS** the early warning systems that failed to foresee the famine (Global Information and Early Warning System, Humanitarian Early Warning Service, and Integrated Food Security Phase Classification) be reevaluated and amended by the Adaption Learning Mechanism;
- 2) <u>URGES</u> the International Commission on Irrigation and Drainage to prepare for droughts by improving irrigation systems and the Association for the Advancement of Agricultural Sciences in Africa to provide drought-resistant crops for farmers;
- 3) <u>CALLS UPON</u> local government officials to deter rogue organizations from intruding in international assistance for refugees and countries in need;
- 4) <u>SUGGESTS</u> the Africa Humanitarian Action develop refugee camps more proximate to areas suffering the most and provide a method of evacuating people to said camps.

Recalling statements made by Medecins Sans Frontieres, or Doctors without Borders, that "Ebola is one of the world's most deadly diseases" and that "It is a highly infectious virus that can kill up to 90% of the people who catch it, causing terror among infected communities," and

Acknowledging that fears from some health professionals that the virus could mutate and go airborne are highly legitimate and express the potential the virus has to pose a serious threat to the life and welfare of every citizen of countries without proper infrastructure to combat the crisis, and

Noting that many countries that are potential victims to the virus do not have the type of population organization required to trace the virus as it spreads, and

Considering recent statements by senior UN officials which evaluate the cost of the prevention and eradication effort to be at least \$1,000,000,000, and

Applauding major steps taken by US President Obama, which consist of sending troops, material to build field hospitals, additional health care workers, community care kits, and badly needed medical supplies to the affected regions;

1. <u>Suggests</u> a major amount of funding be allotted by nations which are able to provide such funds to the World Health Organization and Medecins Sans Frontieres in an attempt to secure a vaccine;

2. <u>Calls Upon</u> all nations to acknowledge that the root of the problem lies in poor infrastructure of developing countries and said countries' inability to provide proper care for patients and, therefore, containment of the virus;

3. <u>Beseeches</u> that all permanent members of the UN Security Council provide troops, money, expertise, care and relief packages, and medical supplies to affected regions in amounts to be determined by a specially appointed committee to be organized within the WHO;

4. <u>Urges</u> the UN to organize an annual summit whose sole purpose is to take steps toward funding and supporting African countries such that future outbreaks and catastrophes like this may be avoided.

1) <u>DRAWS ATTENTION TO</u> the construction of the Indian-Bangladeshi barrier that does not have an expected completion date, this being due to delays and other problems with materials for the wall;

2) ENCOURAGES the aid in construction of this barrier to speed up the containment of illegal immigrants, narcotics, rebels, and other dangers from Bangladesh that cross the border every day, including:

a) Financial aid from Bangladesh and other allies of India who seek its well-being,b) Construction materials and forms of labor provided by other countries,

 c) A stronger border police for the duration of the construction (made up of UN troops and more Indian soldiers) so the shoot-on-sight policy can be abolished;

 3) EMPHASIZES the need of the United Nations to draw clear territorial lines between these two nations so bickering over land can also cease, with consideration to:

REALIZING that North Korea's nuclear weapon program was developed illegally without regard for international standards and treaties, and ALARMED that sanctions regime of the Security Council were not able to prevent North Korea from acquiring nuclear weapons, and NOTING WITH GRAVE CONCERN that North Korea withdrew from the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty (NPT) and has not made a good faith effort to comply the standards and protocols of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) or allow inspections of nuclear facilities, and AWARE that the DPRK has threatened to use nuclear and conventional on several countries which endanger the safety and stability of the region, and ALARMED that sanctions regime of the Security Council were not able to prevent North Korea from acquiring nuclear weapons, and NOTING that the situation can only be resolved through utilizing diplomatic means through the use of direct negotiations using the Six-Party Talks as framework, and GRIEVED that North Korea has not complied with Security Council Resolutions or sanctions, and **RECOGNIZING** that North Korea violated the Security Council's resolution 1695 by test firing several missiles in July 2006, and resolution 1874 by not returning to the NPT and the IAEA safeguards; 1) DEMANDS that North Korea immediately sign and comply with the provisions of the NPT; 2) CALLS UPON North Korea to allow frequent inspections of nuclear facilities in accordance with standard IAEA protocols; 3) URGES the Security Council to take actions to prevent further escalation of the crisis; 4) EXPRESSES THE HOPE that the Six-Party Talks may continue again in the near future; 5) DIRECTS North Korea to begin following the standards set by the resolutions of the Security Council;

6) **DEMANDS** that North Korea returns to the NPT and the IAEA safeguards.

<u>Fully acknowledging</u> the effort that has been put forth by various countries and their cooperation in containing and discontinuing the unrest in our world, and especially commending the work being done my militants who combat the ISIS group and other war groups who threaten the peace and well-being of others;

Emphasizing further that the ISIS militant group is believed to be comprised of between 20,000 and 31,500 fighters who pose a great threat to world-peace and to the well-being of those around the world and those who fight to end the violence in Syria, and other locations, and who are dispersing throughout the country of Syria;

1) Further requests the communication between those fighting against unrest in areas such as Syria and against ISIS, and leaders of surrounding countries so they will be prepared in containing violence or war;

2) <u>Calls upon</u> the countries whose citizens have been harmed or slaughtered by war or war groups such as ISIS, such as the American journalist James Foley, and British aid worker Alan Henning, to aid others in efforts to strike down violence and the ISIS group;
