Syrian Conflict Causes Stalemates

The Security Council

began with a PowerPoint to

introduce the chair and

secretary, review committee

rules, and offer help for

questions. Then the delegates

became acquainted by sharing

names, conference

experiences, and favorite dog

breeds.

After this casual
beginning, roll was called
and the delegate from Germany
called to consider topic
three: Syria. The topic was
agreed upon, with resolution
3/4 being debated. A short
list of speakers was made and
exhausted before an
unmoderated caucus was called

to discuss amendments to the proposal. Progress stopped when the delegate from Russia refused to "support anything that helps the rebels," while the delegate from France refused to "support anything that helps Assad." The discussion about support for Assad or for the Syrian National Council revealed that any resolution for either party would be vetoed.

Considering the

diplomatic stalemate, the

Security Council agreed to

table resolution 3/4 in favor

of resolution 3/3, which

focused on humanitarian aid

rather than support for the

SNC. Debate focused on

amendments that the delegate

from Germany, the

resolution's author,

supported. Free and
transparent elections
generated the most worry.

Many delegates, including
Russia and the United States,
thought holding democratic
elections in wartime would be
a poor decision.

Soon afterwards, an amendment striking the clause in question was passed. The Security Council delegates continued discussing the action to try to satisfy the committee and to pass a resolution that aided Syria.
