After almost four hours of debate and frustration carrying over from last night, Economic and Social passed their first resolution on global debt. We aren't only helping world hunger; we're also trying to promote education on the issue which is really awesome."

After six amendments were added and a couple unfriendly ones were still floating around the room, the delegates stepped into their first Committee of the Whole which raised the question about flat taxes being a concern for Kuwait's resolution. Flat taxes could provide a more predictable income from other countries, as others argue that flat taxes could corrupt the poor. The Committee as a Whole also discussed the percentage that should be used from the income, for hiring supervisors and transportation of the resources and funds. Though they all agreed they do not know the exact amount coming in from the funds, some

delegates believe 1% isn't
enough, and others believe it
is. Doubling production of
wheat and rice all across the
world could be a deal breaker
for this resolution passing.

The delegate from Russia, given the nick name "salesman", may have provided the delegates with the golden speech, persuading some of the tougher delegates who were opposed of the resolution to begin with. Russia's sales pitch included calling other countries out, like the delegate from India, whose food resources are going downhill today. He also reiterated the fact that the United Nation's job isn't to control first and third world countries, but to advise and
